Luton Flightpath proposals

Not content with moving the A14 closer to our villages. It now seems that NATS (formerly known as National Air Traffic Services) are considering major changes to the air routes in and out Stansted and Luton Airports. Although both of these airports are some distance away, one of the options for Luton is a hold pattern being established over this area. For anyone not familiar with what this means, aircraft approaching a busy airport often have to queue prior to making their approach and landing. Queuing is achieved by controllers ordering aircraft to fly in a predefined loop pattern at differing altitudes. The next aircraft in the queue comes off the bottom of the stack and makes its approach to the airport. Parish Council Report

Report Of Fenstanton Parish Council Meeting Held 14th February 2008

(brought over from March edition of Spectrum)

Police report.

During the period 9th January 2008 to 12th February 2008 the following incidents had been reported to the Police :-

1 of criminal damage, 1 of attempted burglary and1 attempted theft from a motor vehicle. The Parish Council has been advised that PC Finney (the Parish Community Beat Manager) has transferred to the Metropolitan Police. Details of his replacement will advised once the appointment of a new Community Beat Manager has been made.

Dog fouling.

The Parish Council has been made aware that irresponsible and inconsiderate owners are allowing their dogs to foul in public areas, particularly on Headlands Park Play Area and the open space at Hampton Close. Dog owners are reminded that this practice is contrary to The Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005 and The Fouling of Land by Dogs (Huntingdonshire) Order 2007 and is subject to a fine. The Parish Council, therefore requests those allowing their dogs to foul in public areas and footpaths etc adopt a responsible attitude and clean up after their pets.

Whilst on the subject of dogs, there appears to be trend in owners not keeping their dogs on leads in the Village and, indeed, a flippant attitude by some owners when confronted. This is also contrary to The Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005 and The Dogs on Leads (Huntingdonshire) Order 2007 and is subject to a fine.

If a more responsible attitude is not taken the Parish Council will have no alternative but to pursue the matter with the Dog Warden.

Parking on footpaths and greens.

The Parish Council has received complaints about the number of cars parking on footpaths. It is appreciated, with many households owning more than one vehicle, parking can be a problem to residents. However, parking on footpaths causes unnecessary problems for pedestrians particularly the disabled and parents with buggies. This is an issue that has been raised in Spectrum many times and seems to be ignored. It is requested that consideration is given to other members of the community when parking and one should not forget it is an offence to obstruct the footpath.

The greens within the Village are an integral part of the fabric of the Parish. It is, therefore, disappointing to see vehicles being parked on the greens on a more and more frequent basis. This is of, course, causing considerable damage particularly following the wet winter. Ultimately the costs for repairing the damage must be borne by the Parish Council and, therefore, Parishioners themselves through the precept.

Parish Council Report

<u>Hilton</u>

The diseased beech tree along the High Street was successfully felled and cleared by the contractor on Sunday 2 March. An amount of timber was left on site for residents.

A meeting was recently held with a number of local villages to consider the possibility of joining together to ensure adequate environmental mitigation measures are included as part of the basic design of the proposed A14 upgrade by the Highways Agency. The meeting was considered to have been successful and a draft letter to the Highways Agency was circulated amongst these communities for approval. The Highways Agency, has already informed the A14 Action Group that it would welcome an early meeting with the joint group.

The Council agreed to repeat its earlier concerns regarding proposals to build a house on land South West of Columbia to the Planning Appeal. The Council considered that the proposed house was of an inappropriate design for the location and would be out of keeping with the street scene. The proposed house was also considered to be too large for the plot and the Council was also concerned about site access as well as the impact of the proposed cellar on neighbouring properties. Changes to Columbia to accommodate the new house were also considered to be out of keeping with the immediate area.

The Council has been advised of proposals to build eight wind turbines at Graveley. Each turbine would be over 400 feet high and would be highly visible from all directions. An action group had been formed by Graveley and others to oppose the proposal. The Parish Council believed that there were too many environmental intrusions currently threatening the local area and agreed to write a letter of support to the action group with copies to MPs and District Councils.

The National Air traffic Service had recently made proposals to relocate an aircraft holding pattern to the area around Hilton. Data currently available has suggested that up to 25 flights per hour could use the holding pattern with each aircraft generating up to 60dBs. The Council agreed to research the matter further before making an input to the consultation which closes on the 22 May 08.

A number of residents had recently applied to the Parish Council for licenses to cross the Green. These were currently being assessment by the Council

Anyone interested in the position of Clerk to Hilton Parish Council should contact the outgoing Clerk on 01480 832030. This is a salaried, part time position working from home to a flexible work pattern.

Hilton residents are reminded that the quadrennial election of Parish Councillors will be held on 1 May 2008. Report Of Fenstanton Parish Council Meeting Held 13th March 2008

Police report.

During the period 13th February 2008 to 11th March 2008 the following incidents had been reported to the Police :-

1 of criminal damage and 1 theft of a wheelie bin.

Natural High / Buzz Project.

The Buzz project for young people has worked successfully in the villages of Ramsey Heights, Earith, Wyton on the Hill and Houghton. The project is now identifying three new areas that may benefit from the scheme. Mr. Julian Ayres of Natural High Experience Ltd and a County Council Youth Worker spoke to the Council and explained the aims and ambitions of the project. Fenstanton has been selected to take the project until January/February 2009 due to the limited provision for young people in the Village. Youth workers are already in place and the project will be promoted through Swavesey Village College, the St Ivo School, publicity in the Village and a direct approach to the young people through the youth workers. The scheme interacts with young people of the ages 13 to 18 through arts, sports and recreation. The project is funded through the District Council, County Council, The Big Lottery Fund and other grants although the Parish Council is requested to make a contribution.

Headlands Park play area.

The General Purposes Committee have considered the proposals and quotations from a number of play equipment manufacturers and found the proposal submitted by Sutcliffe Play to offer the best value. The proposal includes the repositioning of the existing springies and chin up bars and replacing existing equipment with 6 new items including a modular unit, swings, a dish roundabout, trampoline and a low rotator. The Committee's recommendation was approved at the meeting of the full Council. It is expected work will commence within the next 6 to 8 weeks A display of the refurbished play area has been exhibited in the School to gauge the comments of the users.

NATS proposals to create new aircraft holds.

The proposal to create a new aircraft holding area to the South West between the Village and Hilton was discussed. The meeting agreed to consult with the District Council to ascertain the full implications.

Annual Parish Assembly.

The Annual Parish Assembly will be held on Tuesday 22nd April in the Church Centre at 7:30pm.

Next Meeting.

The next meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on Thursday 8th April 7:30pm at Fenstanton and Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton. All members of the press and public are welcome.

Club News

Fen Drayton Lakes,

Work has continued on the nature reserve, and in March the emphasis was on improving facilities for people. Guided busway contractors will be strengthening drain culverts over the summer months, before laying the bus tracks later in the year. Paths and bridleways may need temporary closures to enable the work to be done safely, but will re-open as soon as possible. We expect only one culvert to be worked on at any one time.

February's mild weather encouraged many of the wildfowl to depart for their northern breeding areas. Monthly wildfowl counts are done throughout the year, for many years, giving us data to see what has happened over time. In early February, 2,222 wigeons were counted, but a month later, there were only 571, and pintails dropped from 391 to just one. Goldeneye numbers were stable (76 down to 71); these birds usually stay until April, and it is worth looking for them, as courtship takes place before they leave the wintering grounds. The black-and-white drakes tip their heads backwards quite violently, displaying their white chests to the females.

Our new events programme has had to consider the closure of tracks at various times of the year, at dates that could not be set when we printed the event leaflets. You can pick up a leaflet at Ron's shop, when you are getting your fruit and vegetables in Fenstanton. From the beginning of April, we will be charging for our events – previously, our event costs were covered by funding from EEDA and CLG. For special events, it is essential to book as we have a limited number of places. You will be told where to meet when you book. We will be running two mid-week guided walks each month, and these will begin from the small car park on the south-east corner of Elney Lake, closest to Fen Dravton village.

Fenstanton Village Hall

The committee members have been working on preparing the Village Hall site for sale. As many of you may have seen in the local newspapers, we have applied for full planning permission for the demolition of the present building and the construction of two houses on the site. We have yet to hear whether this will be granted.

Meanwhile, we are looking around the village for a suitable site to purchase on which we can build a new Village Hall. We have to prepare a design brief for the chosen architect and we have to find the funds to pay for the construction of the new building. We shall be applying to as many grant-awarding bodies as possible. One of the many requirements we have to fulfil to be awarded a grant is that we have to show we have consulted every resident in the village in a survey as to what they would use a village hall for, what facilities they would like to see included, eg kitchen, committee rooms, games equipment, outside tennis courts, what ancillary offices could be attached to the hall, and which groups would use the hall once it is built.

Next month, Fenstanton residents should receive a survey form which will be delivered with their copy of Spectrum. Please would you all take a just a few minutes to answer our questions and then take the completed form to one of the collection boxes which will be at Ash's Corner Shop, Barkers' Bakery, Ron Jacob's Farm Shop and the Post Office. This will be your Village Hall so your opinions are very important to us because on them will be based the design brief for the architect. All completed questionnaires returned by 23rd May will be entered in a draw for a prize to the value of £100. If you cannot get to a collection box or you have difficulty in

completing the form, please telephone me on 461751 and I or one of the committee will come and help you. If you wish, you may complete the form online at the village website <u>www.fenstanton-village.co.uk</u>.

We shall then analyse all your ideas and opinions on the facilities to be included in the design brief for the groups which might use the village hall. We hope to be able to give the feedback at the AGM/open meeting on 17th July in the Church Centre.

Works at West End of Fenstanton Parish Church

Work is due to start on 31 March to reorder the west end of the church not only to rearrange the vestries, but most importantly to install a WC. The objective is to make the church more user-friendly and accessible for the disabled, not only for church users but for events organised by the community as a whole.

It will be necessary to lay a new drain along the edge of the footpath connecting School Lane and Church Street. This will take place between 5th and 19th April and the contractor will fence off the side where the works are taking place, and not work during the times that children are being taken to and collected from school. The usable part of the path will run nearest to the church; the main gate will be opened, and the small gate closed to make access to the path easier. Nevertheless care must be taken when using this path, particularly during this two week period, as well as for the three month duration of the works.

The parochial church council would like to thank the local community warmly for the fund-raising efforts which have made it possible to complete this much-needed facility for the parish church.

A letter from the Vicar

Thanks, Teenage Christians, & Sunday Worship in Hilton Parish Church

Let me first say how well you have made us all welcome. We have settled well here with you, and that we continue to feel called for me to be your vicar. We believe we are in the right place.

Vicar's letter continued/.....

In essence, this new pattern:

- There will be a single focused *Family Worship* service on the 4th Sunday in the month,
- The existing joint, *Ecumenical*, services with the Hilton Methodist Church will continue on the 2nd Sunday, with its existing pattern of alternating between the two churches,
- The *early morning communion* services on 1st and 3rd Sundays will remain unchanged,
- *Evensong*, the evening service on the 4th Sunday will be retained in the summer months only.

The benefit of this pattern is that families have expressed a desire to joint the teaching of other children at Sunday Club (Sunday school) in Fenstanton. It also provides for the range of worship our congregation has become accustomed to.

The need for these changes has come about because of the need to provide a clear focus for family type worship, together with the time constraints for preparation and support by myself, being only half time vicar for both Fenstanton and Hilton. We intend to review this pattern over the next year, together with continuing discussions with both our Methodist colleagues in Hilton, and with the parish church in Fenstanton, to see how we might continue to improve what we offer.

You are welcome to any of our services. In addition, you are welcome to talk or email me, or to contact one of our churchwardens, Rachel and Ralph (details under our Church entries in *Spectrum*).

Hilton WI

On a very wet and windy evening, we were pleased to see so many of our members and guests at our March meeting to hear our usual monthly report. Among the items raised, it was agreed that the Hilton WI would sponsor a class in the Dog Show to be held on Sunday 25th May.

The Resolutions to be put forward by the WI have been decided as follows: A ban on bottom trawling Inappropriate imprisonment of the mentally ill .

Margaret Wilkes, our Treasurer, explained Gift Aid to the members. We have learned that many WI Groups are now gift-aiding their membership fees and claiming back income tax that can benefit the group. This suggestion is being considered.

Congratulations to Di Watson, as the winner of the Denman Bursary Draw, with Maureen Vincent as reserve.

Many of our members remembered Vinny, the first "Dog for the Disabled" in East Anglia, who visited the Hilton WI. A collection of £32.00 was raised in her memory towards the cost of training of another puppy.

Our Speaker this evening was Geoff Evans, who gave us a very interesting and at times extremely funny talk about "The Life of a Racehorse", illustrated by colour slides.

He was very enthusiastic about his involvement in his work connected with the breeding of racehorses where the main purpose is to breed horses to make lots of money for their owners. Clearly much money is needed to ensure that each breeding mare is put to a stallion with an excellent racing pedigree. The costs of covering a mare ranges from £10,000 -£40,000 and success cannot be guaranteed. However, the foal of one horse covered for just £10,000 was sold for over 200,000 guineas.

The "maternity" care for the pregnant horse is very comprehensive, with scans taking place all through their time. Geoff told us that no horse is allowed to carry twins due to size constraints, but one foal was born weighing over 60 kilos! Most new-born foals are able to stand after five minutes and we saw some lovely colour slides showing very unsteady equine "babies".

We learned details of the training of the young foals, how they become accustomed to riders and racing; how current medical knowledge can repair many injuries, including inserting pins to allow broken bones to heal. Very impressive was the swimming pool built especially for horses, to aid their recovery.

All racehorses have a birthday of 1st January, so even if a foal is born in the latter part of the year, from 1st January next, it is a yearling. Yearlings are sold at the sales, where they are picked by various trainers or their agents, and after undergoing considerable training, then they race. Anyone can go along to watch the sales at Tattersalls, but be very careful not to wave your newspaper! Who knows what you may have bid for, if you do.

Geoff showed us some lovely winter photographs taken during his holidays in Scotland, and also pictures of brown bears from Alaska. But the final slides showed children from a special needs school in Cambridge, obviously enjoying the opportunity to ride. Geoff keenly supports The Riding for the Disabled Association and proceeds from his talks go to the local RDA.

This talk was following by several questions from our members and our thanks were offered by Anne Jones.

Fenstanton WI

On Thursday March 6th we had a very interesting talk on The New Bridges in St Ives by Mrs Bridget Flanagan. The New Bridges is in fact The Causeway which links to the medieval bridge. Bridget started to research its history 4 years ago because it was badly in need of repair. She couldn't find any records but there was a plaque on the bridge with the date 1822. She then looked through the local newspapers for that year and found that it was opened in September 1822. Before this date there was only a raised bank which was often swept away by floods. It also formed part of the Bury-Stratton Turnpike Road and its owners were responsible for its upkeep and repairs. The owners wanted a more substantial structure. A raised road would only form a dam in times of flooding so they decided on a structure with 55 arches which was built by John Turner. St Ives Golf Club used to be the site of a brick works so the bridges were built from local bricks. Work was started in April 1822 and finished in September at a cost of £4,345 7s 6d. The owners of the Turnpike asked the Duke of Manchester who owned the Manor of St Ives to help with the cost but he refused. He also demanded that once finished the bridge should belong to him. However he did not keep the bridge in good repair. The arrival of the railway in 1847 ended the need for stage coaches and the turnpikes went bankrupt as did the Duke of Manchester. St Ives Council purchased the New Bridges. Although the New Bridges were Grade II listed Bridget sent all of her research to English Heritage and it was upgraded to Grade II*. The County Council in view of this has agreed to repair the bridge but it will now cost 4 million pounds

Daphne Loveday gave the vote of thanks saying that although she has lived here for 30 years she hadn't realised the Causeway was in fact 55 bridges.
