The White Swan Pub, Conington,

which has been tied to Greene King since the last century, has been untied and is now a Freehouse, it has been bought by the Conington Pub Co Ltd a company set up by Coningtonians, for the benefit of the Conington community and the local area. The existing tenant Sarah-Jane and her husband Chris Cole got married in St Mary's Church Conington in March and have extended their lease with the new company so there is no change there. According to the company, the two things that will change from March 8th is, the price of beer will go DOWN, and ADNAMS Southwold bitter, Broadside and other quest beers will be served from the barrel from not the pump. There will be additional renovations but these will be carried out gradually over time so as not to disrupt the locals' enjoyment of a pint and bar food.

The direction of the renovations will be back to the last century, not to the future, and as found in Ben Davis's book "The Traditional English Pub - a way of Drinking"

<u>Pre Roman Fenstanto</u>n

Recently we have looked at life in Fenstanton at the time of the Domesday Book (1086), but what was life like here in the village in the time before the Romans came? Writing history is mostly guesswork, it is a case of weighing up all the evidence available and then using the rule of probability.

We have no written records of the first inhabitants of Fenstanton. Writing was unknown and even had they been able to write, the records would probably not have survived to be read by us. Although written sources are not available we are able to take a snapshot of their times through the artefacts that they left behind. For example excavations at Church Farm, Fenstanton, revealed Neolithic to Iron Age occupation either temporary or permanent.

The first permanent inhabitants would have been Bronze Age farmers and breeders of cattle and sheep. Very few finds have been made of these early people although Jack Dady, in his book Beyond Yesterday, advocates that a Bronze Age round barrow (grave), droveway and crop marks to the north east suggest that there was a settlement in Fenstanton as early as 2000 BC.

Cursus was a name given by early British archaeologists to the large parallel lengths of banks with external ditches which they thought were early Roman athletic courses, hence the Latin name *cursus*, meaning "course". Cursus monuments are now understood to be Neolithic structures and represent some of the oldest prehistoric monumental structures of the British Isles. The Cursus in Fenstanton may have had a ceremonial function and it is located near the boundary with Fen Drayton. Later, in the early days of the 1st century AD, it is more than likely that there would have been a significant Celtic settlement on the high ground of the old village. In those times (the 1st century) Fenstanton was in the Catuvellauni tribe sphere of influence, but most probably would have been influenced by the powerful Iceni tribe of what is now Norfolk and Suffolk. People venturing into Fenstanton from any direction would have been really out in the wilderness. The slightly upland areas such as Oaklands were still predominately densely forested and the lowland areas were part of the Great Fen and generally underwater for most of the year. The river Great Ouse ran on a different course from today and followed a line occupied by the Low Road outside Jones's Marina

The structure of a Celtic tribe was based on a belief that everyone had to serve a practical purpose within the community. Their main concerns were feeding the tribe and defending their territory. Coupled with the inefficiency of their ways of working, in particular agriculture, most of the tribal members were put to work on the farms, raising crops and tending the livestock. It was a culture based totally on agriculture. Celtic lands were owned communally, and wealth seems to have been based largely on the size of cattle herd owned

The settlement of Fenstanton would probably have been undefended and most likely consisted of simple small farmsteads with people living in round thatched huts. Their fields would have been of the Celtic type, small square or oblong areas only a few hundred feet in dimension. (cont/p11)

One of the interesting innovations that the later Celts brought to Britain was the iron plough. The heavy iron plough constituted an agricultural revolution all by itself, for it made it possible for the first time to cultivate the rich valley and lowland soils. It came with a price though. It generally required a team of eight oxen to pull the plough, so to avoid the difficulty of turning that large a team, Celtic fields tended to be long and narrow.

In Fenstanton at the time of the Iron Age, people could not understand nature as we can today and the weather was the ruling factor in their lives. It decided whether the crops succeeded or failed, how many of their people would perish in a hard winters and how many of their livestock would die in the snows. The tribes could not understand their surroundings, so they invented gods that they could worship. There were a number of Celtic Gods but the dominant religion was that of the Druids. The Druids were a separate tribe; a sort of super-class of priests, political advisors, teachers, healers, and arbitrators. They had their own 'universities', where traditional knowledge was passed on by rote.

They thought that their Gods could be pleased or annoyed by the actions of the people, which in turn had an effect on the wellbeing of the tribe. To upset the gods, could result in a bad harvest and the tribe's people would suffer by being short of food. One thing we do know is that the Celts revered human heads. Celtic warriors would cut off the heads of their enemies in battle and display them as trophies. They mounted heads in doorposts and hung them from their belts. This might seem barbaric to us, but to the Celt the seat of spiritual power was the head, so by taking the head of a vanquished foe they were appropriating that power for themselves. It was a kind of bloody religious observance.

Celtic women had a greater freedom than women would enjoy for another 2,000 years. They could inherit both power and land; they fought beside their men in battle and worked the fields and river. Both men and woman would have tattooed their bodies and especially their faces, mostly in Blue Woad using the Celtic 'swirl' art.

Here we must leave pre-Roman Fenstanton after just a brief look through the window of time.

They are cash payments made directly into a Direct Payment bank account so that you can use the money to make your own social care arrangements.

At our meeting on Thursday 7th March, attended by 40 members and guests, we celebrated our 95th Birthday with wine and gorgeous cupcakes kindly made by one of our members.

Our speaker was Mr Neil Callan who was paying us a second visit, this time to speak about English silver hallmarks.

He explained about the significance of each type of mark: the makers' mark, the assay marks, year marks and duty marks.

Makers' marks were usually stamped onto a piece of silver before it was sent to the assay office for analysis, but sometimes added after assay. Makers' marks aren't strictly Hall marks.

There were many assay offices around Britain each with its own range of marks and Mr Callan showed us illustrations of these, explaining that some of these offices were only active for a short time and therefore items bearing their marks are extremely rare.

He also showed us a table of date letters which are quite difficult to interpret as the differences are quite subtle.

He reminded us of the difference between Sterling silver and Britannia silver and showed us the relevant marks for these.

At the end of the evening we were given the chance to examine a number of silver items and try to interpret the marks, this was great fun and enjoyed by all.

Fantastic Fibonacci

In late spring the Garden is bursting with life – you can practically watch the hop shoots lengthen, the chestnut leaves unfurl, the wildflowers expand in the long grass areas.

The diversity and rate can appear joyously chaotic, but a closer look at many plants reveals pattern and order. One of the most prevalent mathematical manifestations in nature is the Fibonacci sequence, named after Leonard of Pisa, known as Fibonacci, whose 1202 book introduced from earlier Indian mathematics a number sequence 0, 1, 2, 3, 5, 8, 13, 21 and so on – the next number in the sequence is the sum of the previous two.

When these sequence numbers are used as the side lengths of squares which are then tiled together and the corners of each square connected by a continuous arc, a spiral shape emerges. This spiral pattern is seen in plants in all sorts of ways: tree branching, the plated armour of a pineapple, the arrangement of scales in a pinecone. At this time of year, the sequence can be seen in whorled leaf arrangements as they develop around a stem. If you look down a plant such as a sunflower from above, as a bird, you can see the leaves spirally arranged so that each gets maximum exposure to sunlight and to water. This spiral arrangement is seen too in the sunflower itself which is made up of hundreds of florets arcing out from a central point. Later in the year when the seeds develop, this arrangement provides optimal packing of the seeds – they are all uniformly packed and of an even size, not crowded in the centre and inefficiently spaced at the edges.

Looking at plants this closely will be the theme of our Festival of Plants at the Garden on **18 May.** As well as the Talking Plants Tent where you will be able to bring along your gardening dilemmas to ask our experts for help, a marquee devoted to the latest in plant science, Guides throughout the Glasshouse Range with prop boxes chock-full with things like the biggest seed in the world (the vast Coco de Mer), a plant promenade along our Main Walk featuring a boutique selection of local, independent nurserers, our Systematic Beds will be the focus for a range of activities, tours and talks designed to encourage you to look more closely at the structures and the mathematical beauty of plants and flowers. *The event runs from 10am-4pm on Saturday 18 May*, and we'd love to see you there. Normal Garden admission applies.

<u>15 years + Booster</u> From age 15 years a combined tetanus/polio/diphtheria booster vaccine is due for all patients. This is the final vaccination in the childhood immunisation schedule and is as important as previous vaccinations.

<u>Repeat Prescriptions Management</u> In order to help patients that do not use the 'Online Prescription Ordering' with the management of their repeat monthly prescription ordering, from early April we will be offering you the option of leaving your repeat prescription with us when you collect your medication. We will then be able to prepare your medications ready for you to collect the following month; you will be given a slip as a reminder showing the date that you will be able to collect from.

If you would prefer to register for 'Online Prescription ordering' then please ask at reception for login details.

The dispensers will be happy to discuss these options with you when you collect your next prescription.
