Fenstanton of Old: By John Deeks

In early Fenstanton, before the advent of steam engines for threshing, the corn was knocked out on the barn floors using flails. Above the doors of the barns the workers would have nailed the moles and rats they had killed. This was a very old custom and it was done to frighten away other vermin. Game keepers also carried out this practice with Crows and Rooks.



Well into the second half of the 19th century threshing the corn crop by hand in this way

continued to be the predominant way of processing the crop. The grain and chaff (the husks) were then 'winnowed' (blowing a current of air through the grain) in order to remove the chaff and to separate them by throwing the grain into the air, the through-draft from the opposing doors blowing the chaff away from the grain. The introduction of the portable threshing gear and steam engines in the 1850s lowered the cost of machine threshing and enabled its more widespread introduction.

This extract is from the Fenstanton parish church warden's accounts;

20th March 1739. "Be it remembered the day and year above written was bargained and agreed between the parish church of Fenstanton on one part, and Nicholas Mead of Godmanchester in the other part, that the said Nicholas Mead is to kill the moles in all the bounds of the said parish for the sum of twelve years at the price of fifteen shillings a year. The first payment to be paid at Lady Day 1741: Witnessed by hand Nicholas Mead, X his mark".

An ancient custom in this village is a right that belongs to anyone in the village to this day. "Any person in the village of Fenstanton had and still has the free right to dig and fetch away, or cart away clay from "Clay Fields" (these stretched from south of Oaklands to the Hilton road) without payment". Years ago the clay was used to make the level clay floors for threshing. The clay dried hard, equal to our present cement floors. The people also used the clay to Stucco the outside and inside of houses and partly to build the walls with.

In the 18th and into the second half of the 19th centuries, there were no railways; all journeys about the country were by coaches or on horseback, along what passed for roads. The outside coach fare from St Ives to London cost 6/6 (£32), inside the coach the fares was 13/- (£64), children on the lap, half price and 14lb of luggage was allowed. The waterways, rivers and canals were used for conveying most commercial goods. Our river would have been a lively spot then, with large numbers of barges towed by horses, walking along the tow paths that went up and down the river.

Perambulators (prams) were not used by working class people so a small child would be carried in its mother's arms. Outdoors a woman would wear a bonnet and underneath the bonnet and, kept on at all times, was her white nurse-cap that all women wore, as soon as they got married and had become 'matrons'. A shawl or perhaps a little white 'Kerchief' with lace around the edge would be worn on the shoulders. To make extra money many people in Fenstanton made bobbins of pillow lace.

In those days all clothing was handmade; sewing machines were not yet invented. Many farmworkers in Fenstanton wore washed smocks that the women made. The yokes at the top were smocked and ornamented with stiches. These were still worn by some farm workers in the early 20th century. An old man would often keep to wearing smocks after younger men took to wearing coats. A man would have a clean smock every Sunday and knee breaches that buttoned below the knee. These would have a set of breeches buttons, three for each leg, some used bone others pearl buttons.



There were smocks for Sunday best and weddings, usually white. Working smocks were normally brown or grey. Most were made of cotton or linen. The pattern of smocking on the breast often denoted his job. Smocking patterns were also peculiar to local areas.

Smocks were eventually replaced by wide cut shirts, waistcoats, breeches, jackets and hats. Later working men wore fustian jackets (Thick, hard-wearing twilled cloth with a short nap, usually dyed in dark colours), and corduroy trousers. Many men fastened their trouser legs with binder twine to keep out dust,

dirt, mice and snakes! John.deeks@ntlworld.com

UPDATE FROM FENSTANTON PARISH COUNCIL February 2018 (Full Council meeting took place 8.3.2018)

** VILLAGE MEETING**

I have had very few responses to this so far. Please get in touch if you have any topics you would like to see discussed at the meeting. Although the date is to be confirmed an indication of interest in attending would also be appreciated. *We also still currently have vacancies on the Parish Council.*

Planning - Huntingdonshire's Local Plan to 2036

Letters have been sent to the Head of Development at HDC expressing concern over village allotment land, the lack of space for burial ground (in Fenstanton and other villages) the identification of 'Vindis' as being in St Ives and other more general concerns.

Planning Applications

The Parish Council has recently raised objections to several applications which have involved the removal of trees.

Boundary Change

Fenstanton is currently split into two wards - Fenstanton North and Fenstanton South. For District Council elections these have been split between St Ives North and St Ives South. Parishioners in Greenfields, Maytrees and Elizabeth Court (Fenstanton North) have received notification that in District Council elections they will be voting for Councillors in the St Ives South Ward with a new polling station -Sacred Heart Church Hall, Needingworth Road, St Ives.

Update from A14 Cambridge to Huntingdon Improvement Scheme – Highways England

Two representatives from this team presented at the Full Council meeting on 8 March. A summary of points made will be in the draft minutes of this meeting (see website). The work is on time for the new road to be opened by December 2020. A mobile visitor centre will be at Tesco Bar Hill on May 31 along with an archaeological time truck displaying finds made during the construction works so far.

Collapsed Gravestone

A quote has now been accepted for this work and it is hoped this will be started soon.

Chequer Street Green

Cllr Pask and I met with a Highways representative to discuss the erosion of the edges of the green and the pinch point at one end. Further consideration will be given to this. We have put in a request that the yellow lines on Honey Hill green be repainted.

World War 1 Centenary

The Parish Council will be considering how to commemorate this important centenary but I would be very pleased to hear of any ideas or suggestions you have.

A14 Construction traffic through the Village

Construction traffic seen through the village continues at disappointing levels. The Parish Council have requested a further meeting with Highways England to discuss this matter and their commitment to reduce construction traffic through the village. The wooden edging will be removed and the compacted stone foundation with be repaired and then covered with a thin layer of pea gravel.
