Who is eligible for a free NHS vaccination?

All patients aged 65 yrs or over are eligible to receive a flu vaccination People with diabetes or heart disease, or respiratory disease People with liver or chronic neurological disease, or severe kidney disease People with coeliac disease, or have no functioning spleen People with weak immune systems, or having immunosuppression therapy People who are pregnant People with learning disabilities Carers plus Children aged 2-4 yrs

Even if you feel fit and healthy having a flu vaccination can help protect you against the risk of flu and its complications when you are in an at risk group Catching flu at any stage of your pregnancy could also be a risk for your baby

It is important for carers to protect themselves from flu so that they are able to continue with caring

Children 2-4 yrs can receive their flu vaccination as a nasal spray



FENSTANTON PARISH COUNCIL 10th Nov 2016

Police report.

Sgt. Street attended the Parish Council meeting and provided a very informative explanation of the current policing situation in the Parish. The meeting was advised that, although the level of crime within the Parish had increased in the last 12 months this, could be partly attributed to the method now being used for reporting crimes. Despite the increase the percentage of detection remains the same.

Currently an initiative is being undertaken in Hemingford Grey to reduce thefts and burglaries and it is expected that a similar initiative will be undertaken in Fenstanton in the New Year.

A number of other issues were discussed including parking and the advice given was that should any Parishioners observe vehicles that are illegally parked they should call the police. The matter of HGV parking on the A14 east bound slip road was also raised and the meeting was advised that the Road Policing Team had been tasked with patrolling this section of road and to act against lorries parking illegally. A problem that is encountered is that the majority of lorries are foreign and it is almost impossible to take firm action apart from moving them on.

Parishioners are reminded to be vigilant and report any suspicious behavior to the Police telephone 101, Crime stoppers can be contacted on 0800 55 51 11 or in an emergency 999.

Parish Council Elections.

The meeting was advised that it is the District Council's intention to hold Town and Parish Council elections on the same cycle as District Council elections. Should this recommendation be approved the next election for Parish Councilors will take place in 2018 and every four years thereafter. This will reduce the term of office for the current Parish Councilors by one year.

Changes to the Whippet Coaches timetable.

The Parish Council has written to Whippet Coaches objecting to the changes to the timetable although to date no reply has been received. Further to the letter from the Parish Council a Parish Councilor has also been in contact with Whippet Coaches and the following reply has been received: "Unfortunately the 1A is not covering its operating costs. We must, therefore, make changes, but we have tried to protect as many journeys as possible and provide a reasonable level of service. Hopefully the revised timetable (which requires much less resource to operate) will be financially viable.

Removal of telephone kiosks.

BT have advised the Parish council that it is their intention to remove the telephone kiosk on the corner of Chequer Street and also at Rookery Way / Headlands.

Resignation of a Parish Councilor.

The meeting was advised by the Chairman that, due to personal reasons, Cllr. Place had tendered her resignation. The meeting thanked Mrs. Place for the contribution she had made to the Parish Council.

The next meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on Thursday 12th January 2016 at 7:30 at Fenstanton & Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton.

Richard Carter, a former policeman and now a member of staff at the Norris Museum in St. Ives, gave us an informative but entertaining talk about "Law and Order in Huntingdonshire".

One interesting item was the story of the Fenstanton highwaymen, who, after drinking in a local pub, took the road to Godmanchester where they spotted a carriage with 12 outriders. Thinking it might contain something valuable, they tried to hold it up. The outriders were actually bodyguards guarding Oliver Cromwell. They overpowered the highwaymen; one managed to flee and was never seen again, the other was injured and captured, taken to Cambridge and nursed back to health before being executed.

The Norris Museum is closed for redevelopment until early next year but continues to stage events.

A Medieval Christmas in Fenstanton & Hilton:

A Fenstanton Christmas in Medieval England would have been very different to Christmas now. The Church ensured that Christmas was a true religious holiday. Celebrations were for the birth of Christ as opposed to people simply enjoying themselves. Christmas Eve was particularly strictly kept with no meat, cheese or eggs. Celebrations began in the village church on Christmas Day when 3 masses were said and the genealogy of Christ was sung while everyone held lighted tapers.



The whole twelve days of Christmas were celebrated, but not every day was celebrated equally. People would visit friends and it was seen as very much a community celebration. Work re-started on Plough Monday the first Monday after 12th night. However, some of the problems experienced at Christmas then have had a knock-on effect for us. Carol singers in medieval times took the word "carol" literally, it means to sing and dance in a circle. So many Christmas mass services were spoiled by carol singers doing just this, that the Church at the time banned them and ordered the carol singers into the street.

December 28th is a day Fenstanton children would not have enjoyed in medieval times. December 28th is "Holy Innocents Day". This is the day when King Herod ordered that all children under two years of age be killed. In Fenstanton, children were reminded of Herod's cruelty by being beaten, so December 28th was seen by many children as a day of bad luck.

What was eaten on a Fenstanton medieval Christmas Day, most certainly not a turkey? Turkeys come from America and only got to Europe after the discovery of that continent in the late 15th century. The rich would have eaten goose and wild fowl from the water meadows and if they could be caught, woodcock would also be eaten. To make a roast bird look even tastier, medieval cooks used to cover the cooking bird with butter and saffron. This would give the cooked bird a golden colour by the time it was served. However, if the poor could afford it, the Church had a fixed price of 7 (old) pence for a ready cooked goose. An uncooked goose would cost 6 (old) pence, about a day's wages for an agricultural labourer.

For the rich Venison would also be on the menu. The poor would not be allowed to eat the best parts of a deer. However, in keeping with the spirit of Christmas, a decent lord of the Manor might let the poor have what was left of the deer. These parts were known as the deer's 'umbles'. These were the heart, liver, tongue, feet, ears and brains. Mixed with whatever else a cook could get, they were made into a pie. Therefore, the poor would eat 'umble pie'. Nowadays, if you have taken a tumble in life and have to live a standard of life you would not usually be used to, it is said that you have to eat 'humble pie'.

Mince pies are a tradition now for Christmas. In medieval Fenstanton a large mince pie was always baked. However, they were filled with all sorts of shredded meat along with spices and fruit. This recipe only changed in Victorian times when the shredded meat was left out. Christmas puddings in medieval Fenstanton were a spicy porridge and known as "frumenty". This was considered a real treat. It was made of thick porridge (or boiled wheat). Currants and dried fruit were stirred in. The yolks of eggs were also added and, if available, spices such as cinnamon and nutmeg. The mixture was left to cool and set before being served.

Christmas Day was also a "quarter day". This meant that the poor had to pay their rent on this day!

Boxing Day has traditionally been associated with the rich giving gifts to the poor in boxes. This is not strictly true. On Boxing Day, the poor did receive money from their masters but in hollow clay pots with a slit in the top. These had to be broken to get the money out. These small clay pots were nicknamed "piggies". As a result, we now have piggy banks for collecting money in.

Fireworks

Many thanks to everyone involved in making the fireworks display a successful evening. The fireworks committee put on a magnificent display, the Feast Week team sold out of all refreshments and the Parish Council would also like to thank its councillors and volunteer helpers for manning the gate and approaches.

20mph speed restriction

The 20mph speed restriction signs offered by Mick George have now been put in place. It has been observed that Mick George's vehicles have been observing the 20 mph speed limit and the Parish Council would repeat its request that perhaps all villagers could follow suit, and limit their speed to 20mph through the village in an effort to try and reduce the speed of others. The Parish Council hopes to meet with Cambridge County Council in the near future to explore the possibility of introducing a mandatory 20mph speed limit through the village.

Ditches

The low levels of rainfall over October and the early part of November resulted in the levels in the ponds and ditches reducing. The Parish Council authorised some work to be undertaken to address the exposed cable at the end of the Ware. Wooden shuttering will be used to create a false bank with the silt built up around the drain used to infill over the sandbags. It is hoped that this work will be completed shortly.

Parishioners will have noticed various works on the roads leading north and last month we were advised that Highways England have obtained blanket road closure notices on these roads to cover the proposed term of the construction project. They have to then give 14 days' notice for any proposed road closure. So far the A1198 has been closed for one weekend and the B1040 and low road are also scheduled for weekend closures. The Huntingdonshire Local Group of the Wildlife Trust is pleased to present a Christmas Miscellany on Wednesday 14th December at 7.30pm at Brampton Memorial Hall, Thrapston Road, Brampton.

We will begin with our speaker, Brian Eversham, who has been the Chief Executive of the Wildlife Trust for Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Northamptonshire since 2009. Previous to that, Brian has been the Conservation Director for the Trust and, among other things, he developed the Ecology Groups for monitoring nature reserves. Brian was also head of Zoology and Research Co-ordinator at the Centre for Ecology and Hydrology, Monks Wood from 1983-1997.

Brian has a comprehensive knowledge and interest in wildlife including birds, botany, lichens, insects and molluscs and is the author of the Atlas of the Dragonflies of Britain and Ireland and editor of the Ordnance Survey Nature Atlas. Tonight, Brian will give us an update on the work of the Wildlife Trust, including new discoveries in our area.
