Local Weather Watch

As I was concluding my last article, the 7 day heatwave in early August had just ended, having concluded with two days just short of 32C (90F). Two days later the afternoon temperature was just 13.9C (56F) a difference of 18C (33F). Thereafter, in what was an exceptional summer, August turned out to be almost a “normal” summer month, i.e. some sun, several days with rain and a mixture of modestly warm and cooler days. If you were around in 1976 and remember the summer that year, August was completely dry and warm until the Bank Holiday at the end of the month when the drought was finally ended, heralding the start of a very wet autumn.

This year, up to 10th November, autumn has been quite different from the one of 1976. Days with temperatures well above average have kept on returning accompanied by a large number of days with cloudless blue skies and rain has been an infrequent visitor and has mostly delivered small amounts. So far it has mostly been a benign season, pleasantly warm with several reminders of summer. It has produced a season of beautiful colours and visual delight.

Once again, autumn so far has been largely devoid of frost. The only exception was when a surge of polar air extended across the UK on 26th October, giving a reminder of the colder days to come, the cold spell lasting a week. During this period there were 3 days with an air frost and there was even sleety rain on the 27th. The first frost occurred on the 29th, twenty days earlier than last year. A transformation back to mild conditions was brought courtesy of an ex-hurricane tracking northwards west of Britain, bringing southerly winds enhanced with the remnants of tropical air. Whilst western parts of the UK have experienced gales and periods of heavy rain, for the most part our region has been largely dry. Other parts of Europe have, however experienced exceptional rainstorms with gales and tornadoes. Particularly badly affected were Mediterranean parts of Spain, France and Italy, exceptionally so in northern Italy and Sicily. The northerly blast I mentioned earlier brought massive snowfalls in the Alps, raising the prospect of an early opening of the ski season.

I will finish with an odd curio and a couple of weather jokes for your Christmas crackers.

First, the curio. Was this an “Act of God”?

As we all know Americans like to do things in a big way. At the Solid Rock Church in Ohio, a statue of Christ 18 metres(60 feet) tall, made out of polystyrene and fibreglass on a steel frame was erected in a huge baptismal pool outside the church with arms reaching up to the sky with coloured spot-lights and water jets. It was a startling image. However, on a stormy night on 14th June 2010 the statue was struck by lightning and went up in flames. Allegedly insured for half a million dollars, people wondered whether they should make a claim citing the incident as “An Act of God”.

Churches Together

Churches Together in England has a history going back to the 1980s. As one of the successors to the British Council of Churches in 1990, the organisation is known as the formal 'ecumenical instrument' for the agenda to which the various denominations of Christian churches in England have committed themselves. Basically this agenda commits the member churches including the Anglican, United Reformed Church, Methodist Church and others to work together as they seek a deepening of their communion with Christ and with one another, and to proclaim the Gospel together by common witness and service. Its strength comes from people from different church traditions finding new ways to work and worship together.

Here in Fenstanton the parish church, the URC and the Free Church in St Ives work together in various ways to honour their commitment to 'Churches Together'. We meet together several times a year to coordinate our calendars and events, we hold joint services in each other's churches particularly in January during the week of prayer for Christian unity, in May during Christian Aid week and for Remembrance Sunday in November and we also combine to offer events such as Lent prayer courses. This prayer from the Swanwick Declaration in 1987 which launched Churches Together summarises the aspirations of the organisation:

Lord God, we thank you for calling us into the company of those who trust in Christ and seek to obey his will. May your Spirit guide and strengthen us in mission and service to your world; for we are strangers no longer but pilgrims together on the way to your Kingdom. Amen.

A major new strength and balance campaign is launching this International Older People's day to help people in Cambridgeshire stay stronger for longer.

After breaking a bone in her back two years ago, Margaret found that normal activities were extremely difficult. However, thanks to some simple regular strength and balance exercises at Brampton Memorial Hall, she is now on the road to recovery and doing the things she enjoys again.

Fenstanton History By John Deeks

FENSTANTON SCRAPBOOK Part 1:

In a lighter vein this month a selection of local news from newspapers.

A serious accident happened to John Holley, farmer of Fenstanton who was driving from his home when the axle of his trap broke. The wheel came off and frightened the horse, causing it to bolt. Mr Holley was thrown to the ground though his fall was somewhat broken by his coming down on the cushion of the trap which was cut into two parts. The gig was practically demolished. The horse continued its wild course along the road until stopped by Mr Burgess's yardman, a man named Jefferies, at considerable risk to his own life.

1910

Fire destroyed a large part of the first chicory factory in England, that of J.A. Wootten of Cambridge, at Fenstanton. The caretaker had been using an American oil stove in which he burnt paraffin oil and found the room was on fire. Thinking to extinguish the flames, he threw water on the stove, which caused the oil to run all over the room and enabled the flames to spread rapidly. The brigade tried to pump water from a pond but found the pipes were frozen and the work of saving the factory had to be delayed while they were thawed with boiling water obtained in saucepans from neighbouring cottages. Fortunately the machinery was saved together with the bond room containing two tons of manufactured chicory.

1912

A shocking double tragedy occurred at St Ives when the landlady of the Temperance Hotel, Market Hill and a German lodger were found in a room of the hotel, both stabbed through the heart. It seems she had been murdered and the man had committed suicide. They were discovered by the maid who returned from a cinema show to find the hotel in darkness. The landlady had separated from her husband and the German worked at the chicory factory at Fenstanton. They had been seen at a theatrical performance in the Corn Exchange and seemed on the best of terms.

1914

Fenstanton cricket pavilion was totally destroyed by fire; within an hour there was nothing left but the charred remains of the wooden fence that surrounded it. All the cricket gear was saved. The pavilion was a 30-year-old wooden structure regarded as the best in Huntingdonshire. It was erected by voluntary subscriptions and insured for £200. The origin of the fire is a mystery.

1932

A nurse travelling in an ambulance was killed and four men badly injured in a violent collision between a London ambulance and a Newmarket horse box at the Woolpack crossroads near Fenstanton. The Red Cross and St John ambulance was proceeding to Leeds to pick up a patient while the horsebox containing three horses from the Hon George Lambton's stables was heading to Lincoln races.

1940

Fenstanton History By John Deeks

The Oaklands Café at Fenstanton is well-run in every way but the owners have installed a gambling machine. One has to put in sixpenny pieces and pull down a handle which sets numbers revolving. If certain numbers come up you win various amounts of money. Police carried out a test: they put in 300 coins and 231 were returned. There was little skill attached and it was a game of chance. There were three buttons on the front of the machine which acted as a brake but the officer was not able to manipulate them. The machine was destroyed.
1962

The first new bell for 210 years was hung alongside the five others in Fenstanton church. It was paid for by a group of American descendants of the Pilgrim Fathers whose patriarch, John Howland was born in the village in the 16th century and members of the society will be invited from the United States to the dedication service.
1983

The Fenstanton postmaster, Anthony Hobbs, has suddenly found himself at the centre of a world spotlight. The Post Office is bringing out a series of stamps commemorating the village's most famous resident, the 18th-century gardener, Capability Brown. Now stamp collectors from all over the globe have been contacting him for first-day covers franked with a special mark designed by Jack Dady and a group of villagers.
1984

The front page of the Hunts Post on November 22nd 1918 read; "Peace, Longed-for and fought-for has at last arrived".

Fenstanton Children's Festival

Mr George Burgess C.C, of the Gables, feasted the school children of Fenstanton with biscuits etc. On Monday evening he handed out smokes to the adults which he had purchased at a Red Cross sale in St Ives last year and he has kept especially for the event.

A call to residents to play an integral part in this once-in-a-generation opportunity to impact local education provision.



Cornerstone Free School Proposal needs the support of residents in Fenstanton and Hilton! We are pursuing an opportunity with the Department for Education, to establish a new **Secondary School** near St Ives. Free Schools were introduced by the government in 2010 as a way of raising standards. They are funded by the government at the same level as other state schools but are not controlled by Local Authorities.

The proposal for Cornerstone Free School is truly **unique**. It will be founded on three core pillars: "Individualised Education";

"Enterprise" and "Faith". Resting on these three pillars, Cornerstone Free School seeks to be an exceptional Secondary School with an innovative curriculum, tailored to individual needs where every student excels, and with a Christian ethos running through teaching and learning. There is a huge gap in the market for this in Huntingdonshire. There is currently no other option for a faith school in our area that is non-fee paying and that models itself on the Independent Sector, whilst being accessible also to students from areas of high deprivation, and promising to fulfil the potential of all. We desire to put the enormous fun back into learning, to inspire students to be the best they can be, through appropriate challenge and support. We plan smaller class sizes, a longer school day (with longer holidays), a wealth of extra-curricular and co-curricular clubs, an afternoon a week dedicated to sport and an innovative curriculum to embed a love of learning.

Curriculum plans centre around the word "**Enterprise**". This will include strong links with local businesses, real-life learning to prepare students for good universities or good jobs and to encourage them to decide on the right route for themselves as an **individual**. We want to encourage students to be enterprising socially and personally to reflect the **Christian ethos** of the school. Students would be encouraged to shop for the elderly, read books and make tea in a nursing home or volunteer in the community. This is designed to get pupils to empathise with the world around them, understand the intricate makeup of society, how it is structured of many layers of people with different ages, needs, beliefs and priorities – all valuable in their own right. So, whilst we plan a very academic school, this will be more than just a school, it will be a school with a culture nurtured through the Christian faith and an enterprising curriculum.

The application for Cornerstone Free School has been submitted and is being read and analysed by the DfE. We need now to engage with potential parents and generate support for the proposal. We currently have 160 people signed up to receive updates on the progress of our application, with many using the sign-up opportunity to send us feedback: "There is a lack of Christian schools in East Anglia and one is desperately needed"; "**An inspiring curriculum, a Christian grounding, enterprise embedded in learning, exceptional results – what is there not to love?**"; "I have three very different children. I'm desperate to see a school that will cater for each of these as individuals with different talents and different needs". These 160 "signups" are indicators to the DfE as to how much demand there is for a school like ours in Huntingdonshire.

FENSTANTON PARISH COUNCIL – UPDATE - November 2018

CLLR PETER WEST

It is with great sadness that we report the death of Cllr. Peter West. Peter moved to Fenstanton some 45 years ago and has been a Parish Councillor for well over 15 years. He will be missed within the Parish Council and across the Fenstanton Community.

Peter and his late wife Joyce leave a daughter, a granddaughter and a grandson. Our thoughts are with them at this time.

COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE LEVY (CIL) WORKSHOP

In addition to significant progress on current projects including:

Chequer Street Play area. Additional funding has been confirmed from the Mick George Community Fund. Contracts are being prepared and final plans being drawn up. Work is scheduled to start early December. Local residents are to be notified when confirmed.

Adult Outdoor Gym by the Headlands Football Pitch. Additional funding has been confirmed from the Mick George Community Fund. Contracts are being prepared and final plans being drawn up. Work is scheduled to start in early New Year. Local residents are to be notified when confirmed.

Village Pond and Clock Tower Area Restoration. Additional funding has been confirmed from the Mick George Community Fund. Detailed plans are being prepared.

Cycleway along the Fen. Ongoing discussions with CCC transport team have been very positive. Further consultation is underway, with a possible green light in April 2019.

Improved kerbs for village green areas. Quotes received, references being collected. Work likely to be approved at the next FPC meeting (6/12/18).

Additional bins and seating around the village. Purchased and being installed over the next few weeks

The Parish Council has received a number of new suggestions and ideas from parishioners on how current and future receipts from CIL may be best used in the Parish. The Parish Council has met to consider these, set priorities and task councillors with carrying out further evaluation and, where appropriate, with finding additional funding from external sources.

GRANT APPLICATIONS

Annual Parish grant applications were discussed at the Finance and Constitution meeting on 8th November and the Parish Council has confirmed grants to:

- Fenstanton Friendship Group;
- Fenstanton Village Sports Committee;
- Rainbow Guiding Group;
- Fenstanton Youth Football Club.

Following discussions with a number of community groups within the village around both CIL and Grant funding, there appears to be a significant opportunity to source additional external funding for these groups. Fenstanton Parish Council will be running a workshop on identifying and preparing fundraising applications for external bodies in the early New Year.

Pitfield Close

Adopted by CCC. Pitfield Close, has been adopted and will be maintainable at public expense from 13th November 2018 by Cambridgeshire County Council. Any current repairs, such as potholes, can be reported on-line at: <https://www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/residents/travel-roads-and-parking/roads-and-pathways/roadworks-and-faults/>

Conington Rd.

Flooding risk. Concerns from residents have resulted in the PC reporting to the District and County Council the risk of potential flooding on Conington Rd (Fenstanton side) after the removal of the hedge and ditch and addition of new homes and solid driveways. Consequently, this is now under consideration by CCC who will undertake a thorough investigation to make sure that area is suitable to implement drainage.

Trees. Residents in this area should be on the lookout for any signs of tree surgery which should be reported to the PC Clerk immediately.

Hilton Rd – Accident Prevention

Restricted views. Residents at the base of the new Hilton Rd /A14 flyover have reported that drivers coming into and out of Fenstanton are faced with a restricted view of oncoming traffic due to several years of overgrowth of trees and shrubs along the road edges. The PC acted on this and, as a result, the section along from the flyover to the Access Rd junction will be 'cut back and sided out' by the County Council. Due to the layout of the area and narrowness of the road, it will require a road closure application which can take a while to be processed.

Speeding. The PC is aware of the increased risk of speeding by motorists accelerating into the village, down the new flyover road, causing greater risks to pedestrians and cyclists as well as nuisance for homeowners. The PC is monitoring this situation

BURIAL BOARD COMMITTEE

This met on 31 October and reviewed its terms of reference and the cemetery regulations, as well as confirmation of the creation of additional burial plots. It also discussed remedial safety work necessary to a number of the trees in the cemetery. This is being progressed urgently.

Report from Hilton Parish Council meeting dated 5th November 2018

A14 (M)

Highways England made a presentation on their intent to apply to upgrade the new A14 to motorway standard. All of the new road would be motorway status, identified A14(M), connecting the M11 and the A1(M). The road would be a "Smart Motorway" without a hard shoulder and with gantries advising reduced, mandatory speed limits. The usual restrictions for slow moving vehicles would apply. Highways England expect the effects of this change on Hilton to be minimal.

The application will be made in the new year with a consultation period in the spring. It is expected that a decision will be made by September 2019 and the application is not expected to delay the road build programme.

Playpark

The surface of the playpark is in need of replacement. This will be expensive and the working group is investigating sources of grants for such activity. It was felt that some grant suppliers would be more interested in sponsoring a complete project and therefore the WG is considering a major refurbishment of the playpark.

Speeding Vehicles and Night-time HCVs

Additional volunteers have been recruited to assist with traffic speed recording through the village and increased police activity has been noted. The recorded data will be submitted to Cambridgeshire Police and it is hoped that the data will show that professional action is required.

Cycle Path

The Parish Council was successful with its application to the A14 Community Fund and agreed to accept the grant and conditions. The money will be used by CCC to undertake a feasibility study of a cycle route to Fenstanton or St Ives.

The Green

Refurbishment work on the existing hard paths across the Green has been delayed to spring 2019. It was felt that work during the winter would be too disruptive with the new grass unlikely to germinate until spring. The PC will give as much notice as possible for the new start date. Some tree work was undertaken at the end of October and the PC would like to thank the volunteers who assisted with these works.

Firework Display

The display was very successful with a high attendance and increased gate monies to secure the event for next year. The Council will email thanks to the firework crew and Feast Week for making it such a success. Also thanks to those that attended.

Reeves Ditch

Following recent rainy spells the water level in Reeves ditch has stabilised. The Parish Council will continue to monitor and expect the ditch return to normal levels.

The next two Parish Council meetings will be on 3rd December and 4th February in the Village Hall. Agendas will be issued in advance on the village notice boards and the Council's website www.HiltonparishCouncil.com. Parishioners are welcome to speak at council meetings on agenda items.

HILTON WI

On November 12th we were lucky to have Indy Leipa, a Hilton WI member until she moved, come to tell us about Christmas in Sweden where she spent much of her childhood and also stories about the different customs and lifestyle there. Scandinavian Christmas is similar to ours, but the food is different. Lots of meat and fish namely moose, deer, reindeer and of course the pig which is loved all year but sadly ends up as a joint of ham. They also eat salmon, sea trout and perch but their main staple was herring. Before supermarkets were established the diet of the poorest people was salted cod which kept them from starving in the long winter and the bread which is made from rye, the only cereal which will grow in the very short time they have in summer as most of the year it is too dark to grow anything.

The table was full of the many savoury dishes, meatballs, salmon and many other dishes which Indy had previously made and we were all asked to sample them.

A favourite was the delicious ginger heart shaped thin biscuits really delicious! There are not many huskies herding the reindeer now it's all done on motor scooters or even drones. Father Christmas here arrives on a painted sleigh pulled by a goat !!!

Christmas Eve is made special by going to church at around 6 am, then going home where the men will drink their alcohol laced with lots of herbs and the ladies will serve ham, potatoes with cheese and anchovies some beetroot and lots of other vegetables. Last of all comes rice pudding which dates back to pagan times when naughty spirits were said to upset the cows unless they had rice pudding at Christmas.

Advent is their main time of celebration and on December 30th they have services to sing songs about celebrating light in a world of darkness.

Women play a prominent part in Sweden they are not discriminated against in society and in most jobs receive equal pay. It is a very forward looking country it may be cold and spend a lot of time in darkness but it is very beautiful with lakes for fishing forests with lots of berries especially cloudberry which are really lovely Anyone can pick them and the people make jam and gorgeous cloudberry pancakes. Then there is the simply wonderful northern lights which attract visitors from all over the world.

A very interesting and tasty evening enjoyed by all of us.

Hilton Produce Show Festive Fruit : The Pineapple

My sister-in-law has always had a pineapple as a crowning monument amidst the Christmas fare. Historically, the pineapple has been an exotic rarity and much has been written about its cultivation. Indeed the fruit created a great flurry of interest from the Restoration period through to the eighteenth century. A famous portrait of Charles 2nd by Heyndrick Danckerts, shows a kneeling gardener handing his monarch a pineapple. The caption could not read “fresh from the glass-house Your Majesty” because it was imported. There is a version of this picture in Houghton Hall, Norfolk.

The craze for displaying the fruit on the dining table of the landed gentry reached fever-pitch in the eighteenth century and competition was fierce. ‘Rent a fruit’ was an option and there is evidence of the fruit journeying between country houses ‘for display only.’ Attempts to grow pineapples were aided by advances in the manufacture of glass. Heated green houses or hot-houses were regular features in the kitchen gardens of the wealthy. There is a letter dated 1757 in the archive at Huntingdon (M49) from Thomas Belaysye 1st Earl of Fauconberg, to the 4th Duke of Manchester at Kimbolton which gives detailed instructions on how to construct a hot-house. Very kindly the Earl explains that he is sending a design by a “tolerable draft’s man” “according to the dimensions of mine”



along with two “pine Apples” by the York stage-coach to “Mr. Hastings of Bugden” (now Buckden!) to be transported thence to the Duke’s residence up the road. He concludes “*I daire recommend this plan as my fruit has succeeded every year.*”

The pineapple is a striking-looking fruit and its decorative appearance has also been exploited, perhaps most notably in the Pineapple House in Stirlingshire, which has an impressively large stone pineapple as the centre-point. Locally, Gonville and Caius College in Cambridge has stone pineapple finials on the Gate of Honour. In fact once you start looking....

Happily, in our more democratic times, pineapples grace tables everywhere, (including my sister-in-law’s), not just in celebrity homes. In fact they are back in fashion. Earlier this year, The Times reported the soaring sales of pineapples; they have apparently overtaken avocados as the versatile health food and “fruit taste” of the moment. We have eaten our way through 44million pounds worth in the last twelve months, mostly from Costa Rica. I think many in the post-war generation would have been surprised to see the number of fresh pineapples piled high in our supermarkets, some costing only £1. For years, they came from tins only.

Finally, we do have a prize for the most surprising entry in our Produce Show. If anyone is interested in growing a pineapple there is a vast literature on the best methods of cultivation. The hot tip is tanners’ bark which seems to offer a consistently warm temperature for the deep growing pits needed to trick the fruit into thinking it is in a tropical climate, rather than Hilton.

With all good wishes for your cultivation plans and for Christmas and the New Year from The Produce Show Committee.
