



Did you know that Fenstanton has No Cold Calling Zones (NCCZ) in Peartree Close, Swan Gardens, Chequers Close and Cherry Tree Way?

These zones were set up to discourage cold callers and to give residents the confidence to say 'no' to uninvited sales people – helping to prevent people falling victim to distraction burglars and rogue traders.

Whilst the zones were originally introduced by Cambridgeshire Trading Standards, it is recognised that community-led action is much more effective in protecting local people from unscrupulous tradespeople. Indeed, the best prevention and support for residents comes from within their own community.

We can offer a range of materials for your residents including door stickers, advice on how to spot a rogue trader and tips to prevent unwanted mail and phone calls. We invite a local coordinator to disseminate this information and look after a NCCZ on behalf of its residents. This would preferably be someone living within the zone but could also be someone residing close by. Could that be you?

If you feel you can help, even if your time and ability is limited, we would love to hear from you. A NCCZ can really be reinvigorated with a little community action; just a good neighbour keeping an eye out makes all the difference.



## The Fenstanton Witch:

I am unable to vouch for the truth of the story of the Fenstanton witch as it is on record as being Fenstanton oral folklore. Apparently, the story is largely taken verbatim from oral Fenstanton villagers' stories. The manuscript of the complete story is in Cambridge University Library. In this essay I have taken liberties with the original so that it will fit in the space that I have in the Spectrum

Elizabeth Cotton was the widow of Thomas Gibbons. After Thomas death Elizabeth became a recluse and as was usual in those far off days, the villagers began to distrust her, suspecting her of having demonic powers. The older and uglier (probably in poor health) she became the more people thought that she was a witch. It is possible that she had some knowledge of medicines and plants with healing powers, but that would have made the villagers even more suspicious. Anything that went wrong in the village would have been blamed on her evil powers. She was described thus; "she might have sat for a portrait of the enemy as far as her eyes were concerned: they were as red as blood and the pupils like a goat's". Every boy or man in the parish was ready to swear she had signed herself away to the devil".



It has to be remembered that the people of Fenstanton in the 18<sup>th</sup> century were uneducated and full of fear of the things that they did not understand. This ignorance was further fuelled by the dogma of the church and the church leaders, especially the local parson or vicar who would have their own agenda. Things that were not understood would have to have been caused by an unseen body, usually referred to as the evil one. The Fenstanton villagers were, at the time, "fen-rustics and little but brutes".

Swimming a witch involved throwing the suspect into water, with her left hand or thumb tied to her right foot, and her right hand tied to her left foot. The guilty would float the innocent sink. The original story suggests that Mother Gibson was ducked in the village pond, not one but four times before she finally drowned.

Necromancer is a person who practices necromancy, a discipline of black magic used to communicate with the dead to foretell the future. Two young clerics studying at Cambridge decided to pay a midnight visit to the grave of Old Mother Gibson.

Their mission was to recover part of her shroud and a lock of hair for use in a magical ritual which, if successful, would bring them great wealth. Only the most 'well-off' people could afford coffins; the rest were buried coffinless in their woollen shrouds.

So they set off from Cambridge and walked quietly on towards the sleeping village of Fenstanton. On the north side of the dark church, not more than ten yards from the new-made grave, they picked out a space where the grass was shortest and drew two large circles, one within the other. And in the space between the circles they marked out with some pains the symbols of the planets and a few Hebrew letters

They were determined to obtain the ingredient for future spells, which should enable them to command the forces of nature. They planned that they would go through certain forms of words which would have power to make the corpse of the old woman buried that day arise out of the grave and come to them. Then they would remove some hair and shroud. They were to go back to their College the next day; and in seven days' time, they hoped they would be rich and powerful.

They were reading the 91st Psalm when a blacker cloud than usual left the moon's face and one of the clerics fell like an ox at the feet of the other. Looking over at the grave, he beheld crouched upon it a shape. It was the figure of an enormous bat, with folded wings and hints of head approaching the human form. In a short moment, he caught sight of the folds of wrinkled skin that hung down from the cheeks, of the wide ears which shone transparent in the moonlight, and of the two lines of dusky red fire which marked the almost closed eyes.

Then he saw the earth heap upon which this being was crouched, stir and wave beneath it. The terrific appearance rose to its height and for a minute seemed to look about as if for a victim whom it knew to be near. The creature all of a sudden turned full in his direction and stepped swift and straight towards him, not flinching for an instant. In another moment, its talons were raised toward his face, and the cleric knew no more.

In the morning, the cleric who had not witnessed the creature took the other one back to Cambridge and it was he who, for the next twenty years, sheltered and ministered to the stricken man.

### **Closure of the Low Road.**

The County Council Highways department has advised the Parish Council that major bridge works to replace Turnpike Bridge and the Low Road culvert are to be undertaken. Minor works are expected to commence on 21<sup>st</sup> January and the main works to begin on 6<sup>th</sup> February. The road and junction are expected to be closed for 3 weeks from 22<sup>nd</sup> April until 14<sup>th</sup> May as well as two weekends prior to the major works commencing. No specific dates are available at the time of writing although it is possible these will be between 25<sup>th</sup> February and 9<sup>th</sup> April and one subsequent weekend at the end of the major works which are currently expected to be 24<sup>th</sup> / 25<sup>th</sup> June. The Parish Council is advised that adequate signage will be in place well in advance of any closures.

Thinking it might contain something valuable, they tried to hold it up. The outriders were actually bodyguards guarding Oliver Cromwell. They overpowered the highwaymen; one managed to flee and was never seen again, the other was injured and captured, taken to Cambridge and nursed back to health before being executed.

The Norris Museum is closed for redevelopment until early next year but continues to stage events.

## CAMBRIDGE BOTANIC GARDENS

### Caring for Orchids



It's that time of the year again, the heady days of summer seem so far gone and Spring is still a couple of months away. The garden is short on flowers, but for a couple of winter staples. This is when house plants step into the fold to provide some much needed winter colour. Amongst these is the moth orchid (Phalaenopsis) which has saturated the market with its exotic blooms and affordable price. It does, however, remain an enigma to many when it comes to watering regime and re-flowering. This is one of the most common questions I get asked, so here is a quick guide

to orchid care.

Phalaenopsis is a mainly tropical genus, so these orchids are best grown at temperatures above 18°C. In their natural habitat, they grow on trunks and limbs of rainforest trees, in medium to low light and so when kept as houseplants, they are best kept on an east facing window sill, which receives the gentle rays of the morning sun. They should be potted in a coarse bark and watered with a wet-dry cycle allowing the roots to dry, but not desiccate, before re-watering. The key to keeping orchids healthy is to avoid overwatering them. Between Halloween and Valentine's Day watering should be reduced considerably, with moisture being added a couple of times during this period. And finally re-flowering: you can initiate this by a drop in temperature of 2-3°C for a couple of weeks. Do this during the winter period when you reduce the watering, or move the orchid to a cooler location in your house. It should then be a matter of weeks before you see a new flower stalk emerge. Watering should remain as per above and this is also governed by light and temperature.

If this has whetted your appetite for a bit of winter colour, then why not visit the Garden, where our Orchid Festival will run from 12 February to 12 March in the warmth of our Glasshouse Range. This year's theme is India and will showcase an array of South Asian orchids, many drawn from the Garden's reserve collections, to provide a colourful taste of the Subcontinent – enough to brighten up any dreary winter day.






