#### SKI BUDDIES 2018 SUPPORTING WOUNDED VETERANS

In March 2018, I will be joining around 26 Veterans and a similar number of volunteer Ski Buddies and medically trained specialists, for a ski based induction and support week in the Swiss Alps. The Ski Week is the start of the ongoing rehabilitation programme involving mentoring, pain management and the searching and securing of jobs and work placements. Every Veteran involved has sustained permanent life altering injuries - mostly from Afghanistan or Iraq. They range from severe physical injuries to combat stress (PTSD).

Bad weather is always possible and power cuts do happen. Our electricity network is built to be resilient but extreme weather can damage overhead power lines resulting in some customers losing their electricity supply. Where this happens we work to restore power as quickly and safely as possible.

We advise people to stay clear of power lines and report damaged power lines immediately by calling 105 free from both a landline or a mobile phone. If they see electricity lines that are down or causing significant risk to the public they should call 999.

Extra help is provided to customers on our Priority Service Register during a power cut. Households with older or disabled people, those with children under five, or where someone uses medical or mobility equipment that requires electricity as well as other reasons can join the register. 

#### Fenstanton and William Wallace (Braveheart):

Many of you will have seen the film 'Braveheart' staring Mell Gibson. It was a drama based on real events but should not be confused with factual history. Wallace was regarded as a revolutionary leader or a traitor and terrorist, depending on which side of the Scottish boarder you were born. But did you know that Fenstanton had a part to play in this historical event?



William Wallace was born in the 1270s in Renfrewshire, Scotland into a gentrified family. Very little is known about his early years and there are significant periods of his life for which there are no reliable sources. In May 1297, Wallace attacked the town of Lanark, killing the English sheriff and unrest quickly became full-blown rebellion. In September 1297, Wallace defeated a much larger English force at the Battle of Stirling Bridge.

The shock of the defeat at Stirling rallied the English around Edward, who marched north with an army. In July 1298, the Scottish and English armies met near Falkirk, and the Scots were defeated. Wallace was seized in or near Glasgow in August 1305,

and transported to London. He was charged with and tried for treason, which he denied, saying he had never sworn allegiance to the English king. His execution was held on 23 August, where he was hung, drawn and quartered.

The de Segrave family had been Lords of the Manor of Fenstanton and Hilton for many years. Sir John de Segrave held the manor title from 1295 to 1325. The de Segrave residence was a manor house and was at one time considered to be equal to a palace and a worthy residence for a Segrave.

In 1235 Queen Joan of Scotland and Lord of the manor of Fenstanton and Hilton had built herself a manor house in Fenstanton. As explained in a prior essay there is some dispute as to where this manor house would have been. Jack Dady in his book Beyond Yesterday said that he considered the most likely site would have been where Grove house sits today.

Gertrude Peet said that her research in the Cambridge University library led her to believe that the manor house sat where Hall Green is today. The land around Hall Green is described on an old map as 'Biggins', which is Saxon for manor, so she could be right.

By 1564 this manor house was referred to as a rectory and belonged to Bishop Cox of Ely. It is here that Queen Elizabeth I dined with Bishop Cox on her way to Hinchingbrooke House. It is now impossible to be sure where this building would have been in the village, although on balance I would think that Gertrude Peet was probably right and it is more than likely that Hall Green would be the most likely candidate

It was to Fenstanton that Sir John Segrave brought his prisoner, Sir William Wallace (Fenstanton being situated on the York to London Road) on the way to his trial in London. Here also Wallace's quartered body would rest on its way back to Scotland.

We can only imagine the excitement in the village when such a famous person was brought here and stayed overnight. Even more so when a few weeks later the same man's dismembered parts were once again in the village. William Wallace's head was dipped in tar and then displayed on a spike on London Bridge. But to warn the Scots of what would happen if they should rebel again his dismembered parts were put on display in Scotland. His legs were displayed in Berwick and Perth, his arms in Stirling and on a bridge at Newcastle upon Tyne.



## Meeting of the Parish Council on 4 December 2017 Parish Plan

Outstanding Actions from the 2005 Parish Plan were discussed, particularly those actions that had now been completed and those that could be pursued further. Council agreed that the three actions to currently focus on should be: Bus Scheme, Pavilion and Cycle / Footpaths. It was suggested that the Plan should be reviewed again in about three years' time.

#### **Bus Survey**

13% of the Bus Surveys were completed and returned. The most popular destinations were St Ives and Cambridge and the most returned surveys came from the "over 66yrs" age group. The PC will contact St Ives Town Council to be included in an informal meeting on the subject of the local buses.

#### **Email Database**

The council is keen to establish a comprehensive database of email addresses for parishioners. To ensure compliance with the new General Data Protection Regulations GDPR (May 2018) please be aware that our clerk recently attended training on the subject. As early into the war as 1915, 28 Hilton men had enlisted, this was from a village with a total population, including children, of 273, but sadly 12 were not to return.

Hilton you are the most generous people for so many different causes so thank you again for your generosity on behalf of service men, women and their families who will be recipients of the Royal British Legion's support.

#### **Spring Colour**

A packet of seed sits in our kitchen waiting for the planting season. The label reads "Heliotrope". I bought the seeds because no plants were available in

the neighbourhood last year. It is a member of the borage family (a plant which self sows prolifically in our garden) and has the characteristic fleshy leaves, but in a darker green. The most distinctive thing about this plant and the reason I think it should be more widely grown is the amazing, exotic smell of vanilla which fills the air around and wafts into the house if you have some by the door. Some people refer to it as the "cherry-pie" plant, but for me it is pure vanilla.

The "helios" bit of its name refers to its habit of turning to towards the sun, so it does like

south or west facing site. Apart from that it is a trouble-free half-hardy annual easily grown. Victorians were as enamoured of it as they were of bedding schemes featuring brightly coloured displays of annuals.

I knew the name first as a colour. My grandmother insisted that her new Spring coat, hat and matching umbrella were neither lilac, nor purple, but heliotrope. It moved me to giggles at the time but has remained as an enduring memory of a truly awesome outfit! Victorian ladies did wear the colour, indeed the Launceston Examiner of 1882 in an article entitled "latest Paris fashions" reports that there is "no doubt" that the "heliotrope colour" will take the lead in Spring fashions. Fashion is fickle as we know.....!



Do grow the plant but don't wear a matching parasol! If the seeds thrive, I may have some surplus plants for sale in aid of the 2018 Hilton Produce Show which will take place on <u>Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> July</u>

Then came a surprise! Three of our members read a play written by Carol Yarrow who has written quite a lot of them .It was well received by everyone, well done to Donna, Jan and Kath for being brave enough to perform in front of their friends especially as they all had to read things that were some times applicable to them in a tongue-incheek kind of way!

A quiz tested our knowledge of Christmas carols and there is always one answer that no one knows but it's all part of the fun and we all had a great Christmas Party and are ready for all the speakers and outings in 2018. Our January meeting was a brilliant start to the New Year as Helen Tilley brought a selection of her handmade fantastic fascinators and handsome hats in all different styles and colours. She originally found her inspiration on a visit to Cornwall and after a time decided that she would try making some fascinators for herself. Soon friends asked her to make some for them, so she attended several courses and she now makes about two hundred a year. All her hats are hand made to the customer's specific requirements and no two are ever the same.

She uses quite a variety of materials including felts, plant based netting, brocade and adds a lot of decorations like feathers, silk flowers ribbons and brooches. In order to make the hats she had to buy wooden hat blocks which are very expensive but essential to make a base to make the correct shape to mould the felt or other materials which have to be steamed and then stretched over the block as tightly as possible. They are then left to dry and can be decorated to the customer's particular requirements.

It takes about a week to make a fascinator but about three weeks to make a hat. Helen also makes bridal headwear and can make bespoke hats for the bride's mother and other ladies to match their outfits so they can be sure no one else has one like it.

A very good thing to know if you have a wedding to go to in the future! She also brought a selection of her handmade necklaces and earrings which were very pretty and reasonably priced.

Remember craft club is on 1st February but the drawing class will not start until March.

The February meeting is called Re-thinking your garden and Andrew Sankey will be telling us how to go about it so get your thoughts into spring mode and look for some inspiration to get out in the garden.
