'Fenstanton as I knew it as a child' by Christine Collison

Meg, brother Geoff and I, Christine, lived at Hilton End Farm down the Hilton Road with our mum and dad Perce and Dora Burgess, my brother Tony, came along later. We had no electricity, gas or running water. Evacuees came and went. Italian prisoners came to work on the farm and rationing started. It was 1941 and my first day at Fenstanton School.

I waited patiently for my dad to finish milking the cows and then travelled to Fenstanton in our horse and cart with the churns of milk which were to be delivered to the dairy. Fenstanton School in those days was in what is now known as The Church Centre. The land opposite the school, where Fenstanton & Hilton School is now, was a lovely orchard with apples and plums galore in the summer. Opposite the cottages down School Lane were the school gardens where boys from the school had their own piece of land to grow vegetables. The playground was the yard outside the Centre – there was no playing field, the outside bucket lavatories were quite a distance from the school, but we did have an undercover play area which we called 'The Gym', now used for storage. Most children went home at midday, but for those who couldn't, school dinners were delivered in canisters in the morning to be kept warm until dinnertime. After we had eaten, we would wander down the Fen (there were no dinner ladies) where Mr and Mrs Chillery lived and ran a vegetable nursery with massive greenhouses on either side housing mostly tomatoes. Hilton children had their own school and were to join us in 1959.

I can vividly remember Chequer Street with the pond opposite Ron's vegetable shop, the pump on the green, the cobblers in one of the terraced houses, Henry Tabony's fish and chip 'shed' at the end of Hall Green Lane, Grandma and Grandad Burgess' farm to the right of the Chequers Public House, Constitutional Hall and the many happy Saturday afternoons we spent watching cricket on Hall Green field, two cricket elevens but no Sunday cricket then!

Ant Hobbs and his wife (Grandma and Grandad Hobbs) lived and ran the Post Office which was two cottages knocked into one. It was after they died that the old Post Office was knocked down and the present one built on the same site

With no by-passes then, traffic went straight through the village and High Street consisted of a Blacksmith (where Mo's Motors is), a barbers, two bakers, two butchers, three grocers, a 'sweet' shop and a garage as well as the dairy and two pubs. The Lindens was a children's home where we made many lifelong friends with children who stayed there because of various difficulties in their lives, and the now derelict building next to the Lindens was a beautiful house which hosted many Fetes and Garden parties.

On the corner of Swan Rd and Church Street were two tennis courts with allotments on the land where Walnut Tree Crescent is. The Vicar and his family lived in the Old Vicarage opposite and we looked forward every year to the Church Fete which was held there on the vicarage lawn which extended to where Bourdillon Close is today.

Finally, I have to mention the Street Party the village organised at the end of the war. Chequer Street was the focus of celebrations with tables decorated and Union Jack flags and bunting galore, sandwiches and cakes for all the village children who joined the rest of the villagers at a bonfire party on Hall Green field afterwards.

CAMBRIDGE BOTANIC GARDENS

IN THE NIGHT GARDEN

As the bell sounds across the Botanic Garden and the last of the visiting public leave, a new shift of flowers comes into bloom with the setting sun. This floral transformation is rarely witnessed, but includes some of the plant kingdom's most elegant flowers and delicate perfumes.

Flowers, whether night or day opening, are the advertising hoardings that plants use to attract pollinators. But, in the case of night blooming species, colours in the visible spectrum become redundant. It is scent and contrast, usually white petals against a dark sky, that matter and this suite of characteristics is a common theme in the floral plan of species with night blooms. They appeal to crepuscular (activity at dawn and dusk) and nocturnal animals; bats, moths, mice and oddities like the kinkajou, a small rainforest mammal native to Central and South America. The Garden holds many of these exotic night bloomers, but there are also plenty of temperate candidates for your own garden.

Evening primrose (*Oenothera spp.*) are easy to grow biennials and, as their name suggests, open in the early evening, unfurling before your eyes. Under ultraviolet light, the lovely, wide-cupped flowers are shown to have spectacular nectar guides, invisible to our eyes, but hugely helpful to the pollinating bees and moths on the hunt in the gloaming. The bees are persuaded to stay up past their usual bedtime by the rich scent and nectar lures and live a shady half-life moonlighting as pollen chauffeurs. This behaviour is known in the zoological world as a vespertine (evening) temporal specialism.

A tender plant for pots and borders, the night phlox, *Zaluzianskya capensis*, is steadily increasing in popularity. We grow night phlox nestled near its mullein and snapdragon relatives in the figwort (Scrophulariaceae) family on our Systematic Beds, and the flowers have an exquisite, heavy vanilla scent. The petals are fused into a tube which splays at the apex into five flat appendages. The tube prevents all but an elite group of insects - long-tongued, night-flying hawk moths (Sphingidae) - from accessing the highly prized nectar lure.

So take the opportunity as the nights get warmer this month to get to know your garden after dark, and discover the hive of activity ongoing through the night. On June Wednesdays, the Garden opens late until 8pm for you to enjoy a peaceful wander and discover those plants just coming onto the night shift, including our exotic rainforest climbers and arid land cacti, the flowers of a great many of which open in the evening.

The Botanic Garden is open 10am-6pm through June–September (on Wednesdays in June the Garden remains open until 8pm). Admission is £4.50, Giftaid admission £4.95 or join the Friends, get free admission and help the Garden grow! FENSTANTON PARISH COUNCIL- 8th May

The Parish Council meeting held on 8th May was also the Parish Council's Annual General Meeting. Cllr. Robert Henderson was elected as Chairman and Cllr. Paul Kent Vice Chairman for the ensuing year.

Police report: During the month of March, the latest month for which official information is available, the following crimes and incidents were reported:

4 incidents of anti-social behaviour; 2 incidents of vehicle crime; 1 incident of violence; 1 incident of criminal damage.

A communication had been received from the Police advising that in the last month there has been a slight increase in the number of burglaries in the Village. The Police are keen to reassure Parishioners that they are taking positive action investigating the crimes, following up leads and patrolling the areas to prevent further offences.

Parishioners are urged to ensure that all doors are locked and windows are closed when properties are unoccupied and to be vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour to the Police telephone 101, Crimestoppers can be contacted on 0800 55 51 11 or in an emergency 999.

A14 Improvement: A statutory pre-application consultation on the A14 Cambridge to Huntingdon improvement scheme commenced on the 7th April and concludes on 15th June. The Parish Council will respond to the consultation but requests that Parishioners also make their points to the Highways Agency. The document can be viewed at www.highways.gov.uk/A14CambridgetoHuntingdon. The Parish Council has also agreed to make a representation should a public Inquiry be called.

Next Meeting: The next meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on **Thursday 12th June 2014** at 7:30pm at Fenstanton & Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton. Members of the public and press are welcome.

From Cambridgeshire Police

Last week a warning was issued about the fake police officer scam. If you have not seen this on BBC News can I update you that six men who were arrested on Wednesday, April 23 were charged (Friday, April 25) and remanded in custody.

The men were arrested following a number of warrants being carried out across North London by the Eastern Region Special Operations Unit (ERSOU)*. These warrants were designed to target those suspected of being involved in phone scams in Cambridgeshire, Hertfordshire, Norfolk and Surrey.

Detective Inspector Danny Lawrence who led Wednesday's operation said: "Our robust approach to those suspected of being involved in phone scams will continue but I would like to remind the public that, whilst arrests are continuing to be made, people need to be aware that phone scams are still operating across the region."

Please follow the below advice:

If you are suspicious about a telephone conversation you should end the call and contact police via the non-emergency number, 101. *Remember to use a mobile phone or a friend's phone or wait at least five minutes before calling to ensure you aren't reconnected to the offender.*

Please also remember that your bank and the police would:

NEVER ask for your bank account details or PIN number over the phone.

NEVER ask you to withdraw money and send it to them.

NEVER ask you to send them your bank cards or any other personal property."

*ERSOU was established in 2010 to deliver an increased response to tackling the threat of organised crime across the six police forces in the Eastern Region of the UK.

A14: The Parish Council would like to thank all those who attended the open meeting at the Methodist Church on the 8th May where there was an opportunity for parishioners to address directly members of the new road design team from Jacobs in an open meeting. Jacobs have taken over from Atkins and are contracted to produce the design whilst participating in the public consultation process.

It became clear following the Highways Agency public consultation exhibition held at the Village Hall on the 7th of April, the new road will seriously impact Hilton due to its design and close proximity to the village. This was reflected in the strength of feeling expressed at the open meeting on Thursday.

In broad terms it appears parishioners in Hilton are pragmatic about the new road but are deeply concerned about the negative effect on our village. In particular the impact of noise, air and light pollution which are exacerbated by the height of the road above the surrounding countryside and the subsequent extra height of the three bridges crossing the new road.

In addition there is a fear that with the new road in place, more vehicles will be attracted to route through Hilton adding to an already growing problem of the heavy traffic travelling on the B1040.

It was confirmed by Jacobs staff that Hilton will be a big loser with this scheme. It is therefore important that residents of Hilton mobilise and call for measures to reduce this impact as much as possible.

There is plenty we can do to ensure more consideration is shown to Hilton residents during the design process without affecting those who live in the surrounding villages. Write to your MP, local CCC and HDC Councillors and of course the Highways Agency and ask:

Why does the road need to pass so close to Hilton?

Can you ensure effective measures to mitigate noise and light pollution are put in place?

Why is it 3 metres higher in places than the surrounding countryside?

Why does it appear the design is already frozen before the consultation period is complete?

Why does it appear the design is frozen before much of the required research into expected noise levels, air quality, and traffic modelling has been conducted?

As Hilton is paying such a high price for what is an infrastructure project in the national interest, is it not right that no expense be spared to reduce the impact on Hilton's residents?

WEATHER WATCH

When I concluded my last report in early February, little did I know that we were about to experience the stormiest week of a very stormy winter.

From early December to mid January the UK was battered by at least 12 major storms, with February being the most cyclonic month of any month since records began 142 years ago. In East Anglia there was not a single cold spell throughout the winter with no northerly or easterly winds.

There were no air frosts in February and there was no snow in what turned out to be a very mild winter. In fact, the whole of Europe experienced mild conditions during February, with the cold conditions affecting some countries which I mentioned last time, quickly receded eastwards. Some parts of Russia and Scandinavia experienced average temperatures 7C (12+F) above normal.

In the Highlands of Scotland however, they experienced the greatest accumulation of snow for 69 years.

Although parts of the south and west of England and Wales received rains up to two and a half times more than normal during February, by comparison East Anglia again escaped lightly. Gillian Sheail, who is the official rainfall recorder for the Met. Office for Hilton measured a total of 57.6mm (2.25 inches); above average but by no means exceptional.

Much drier conditions took over in March, with no measurable rain between the 4th and the 19th, a total of 16 days. Gillian's total rainfall readings for March amounted to 20.1mm (0.78 of an inch). Although March was another mild month with the overall maximum temperature around 3C (5.4F) above normal, a surge of cold air in the fourth week brought three air frosts and a mixture of rain, hail and sleet showers. It was short lived however, and the last few days of the month and into the start of April brought warm settled weather. Gentle south easterly winds off the Continent combined with air containing Saharan dust

from North Africa created severe pollution for four days.

In contrast to last year when Spring was delayed due to the cold by 4 weeks, the persistent mild conditions this year triggered the Spring season 3-4 weeks early. 26 days exceeded 10C (50F) in March compared with just two days in March 2013.

For the fifth consecutive month, temperatures continued above normal in April. According to the Met. Office it was the third warmest in the last 100 years. High pressure dominated our region for much of the month, and although warm by day, there were several cold nights with late air frosts on the 15th and 16th. The diurnal range on the 16th was 17.6C (31.5F). The total rainfall in April was also below average. Gillian Sheail recorded 17.5 mm (0.70 of an inch).

A fine May bank holiday weekend brought sunny days but also some cold nights with an air frost on the 3rd when the temperature fell to -1.1C (31F).

Given that it is Springtime, I will end with a couple of birds who are believed to respond to the weather. Swallows fly low when bad weather is on the way, because the insects they feed on are forced downwards in low pressure and the term rain-bird is often given to the green woodpecker, whose call is supposed to be a sign of rain. Country folk also call this bird rain-pie and weather cock.

Lastly, the chance of seeing a rainbow tends to be higher in Spring due to the showery nature of the weather at this time of the year, but do you know the longest period of time one was visible for in the UK? It was at Wetherby, Yorkshire on 14 March 1994, when it was visible for 6 hours. This was an incredibly rare occurrence as most rainbows last for only a few minutes.



I can report that arrangements for footpath maintenance are in hand with the Parish Council which has also authorised the maintenance contractor to clear the fallen trees that have been obstructing footpaths in a few places over the winter, so, hopefully, paths should be in good 'walking' order for the summer.

Having visited one of the A14 road shows in the last month I am concerned to note that the current Highways Agency proposals indicate that the Conington footpath (FP No 14 on the Fenstanton FP map) is to be "stopped up" in the parlance of highway planners. In other words we will lose it if we don't complain loudly enough. The planners seem to think that it will be good enough for walkers to walk along the road if they want to go to Conington but, as you will be aware, the Conington Road is very narrow, very windy and has very little space on the verges to get out of the way of road traffic. So, whether you are a walker or not, I urge you to complain to the Highways Agency about this loss of a valuable amenity and the safety issues involved. Be cautious of traders who call at your door Advice from Trading Standards



In the last 5 years it is estimated that £1 million has been paid to rogue traders by older residents living in Cambridgeshire. In most cases the rogue trader will have called at the customer's door offering to do work on their house or garden, and will have overcharged for unnecessary and shoddy work. These are serious crimes, sometimes costing the customer their life savings and often leading to them being fearful in their own homes.

We would like to make you aware of the telltale signs of rogue traders to help you avoid them.

Rogue traders typically:

- Call at the door offering services such as replacing a loose roof tile, roof or gutter cleaning, gardening, house maintenance, jet washing, driveway paving and tree felling.
- Engage with the customer to win their trust. They will seem very friendly and chatty.
- Start with a small job such as gutter cleaning and then claim further work is needed. This subsequent work will not be quoted for and will run into thousands of pounds.
- Fail to give you written notice of your right to cancel which is required for most contracts agreed at home.
- Use intimidation to extort money and often take the customer to a bank or cash point to withdraw cash (a criminal offence).
- Return again and again demanding further payment for bogus reasons e.g. claiming that VAT has not been paid.

If you think rogue traders are currently at your property, are in the vicinity or are due to return, please contact the police on 999. If you think rogue traders have done some work for you but have left, contact our advice partner, Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline, on 08454 040506.

To find an approved trader visit www.buywithconfidence.gov.uk, call the Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline (above) or visit your local library, where staff will be able to look up traders on the scheme for you. We would always recommend getting three quotes to ensure the price is competitive.
