## FENSTANTON PARISH COUNCIL meeting, May 14th

**Police report:** During the months of March, the latest information available, the following crimes and incidents were reported: 2 incidents of anti-social behaviour; 1 incident of violence; 2 incidents of burglary; 4 incidents of vehicle crime; 2 incidents of other theft. Parishioners are reminded to be vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour to the Police telephone 101, Crimestoppers can be contacted on 0800 55 51 11 or in an emergency 999.

**Parish Council AGM:** The May meeting of the Parish Council was also the Annual General Meeting. Cllr. Kent was elected as Chairman and Cllr. Henderson as Vice Chairman for the ensuing year. The meeting also appointed the Standing Committees for the ensuing year.

**Parish Council Casual Vacancies:** Three Members of the past Parish Council did not wish to seek re-election and no other candidates sought election. Consequently an uncontested election was declared and, therefore, three Casual Vacancies now exist. The three vacant seats are now open for co-option. Should any Parishioner require further information or require a Candidates Qualification form please contact the Clerk, telephone (01480 465300). All candidates will be considered by the Members of the Parish Council at the meeting to be held 11<sup>th</sup> June 2015.

**Dairy Crest Site:** Representatives of Morris Homes, the potential Developer for the site, attended the meeting primarily as an introduction to the Parish Council. They were unable to provide any specific details of the development until such time as discussions with the District Council have been held although it was stated that their vision is not significantly different from the design brief. Further meetings will be held with the Parish Council once the discussions with the District Council have been held.

**Wiser Recycling:** A collection of unwanted electrical items will take place on 1<sup>st</sup> June.

**A14:** A representative of the Parish Council attended the A14 Preliminary Meeting held by the Planning Inspectorate on 13<sup>th</sup> May. The Parish Council will produce a Statement of Common Ground and will be represented at the Public Inquiry. An open meeting is to be held in Hilton on 30<sup>th</sup> July.

**The next meeting** of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on Thursday 11<sup>th</sup> June 2015 at 7:30 at Fenstanton & Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton. Members of the public and press are welcome.



### **A14**

The Preliminary meeting organised by the Planning Inspectorate was held in Huntingdon on 13th May. At this meeting we learnt in detail how the examination process would be conducted over the next six months and we also had an opportunity to voice some of our concerns.

The working group has met with the sound expert who prepared a report for the Parish Council in 2010. His thoughts and recommendations to date have provided useful information especially during the writing of the detailed representation which the PC has prepared which will be submitted to the Planning Inspectorate. We are aware that the Planning Inspectorate will possibly hold a meeting in the village in July. Full details will be advised as soon as we have them.

### **Feast Week**

The Feast Week committee asked the PC if they could use part of the green near the maze, where the marquee is usually sited, for the Summer Fete they are organising on 6th June 2015 to allow stalls to be set up by local groups and organisation. This was agreed.

### **Community Chest Fund, May 2015**

An application has been made to this fund to finance an update to the Village Handbook; the outcome of the application will be advised in due course.

### **Rural Housing Exception Scheme**

As it has been some years since the last survey of need for affordable housing in Hilton, Huntingdon District Council has asked Hilton if we would like to conduct a new survey under the Rural Housing Exception Scheme. Further clarification of the full implications of such a scheme has been sought by the PC from HDC and this will be discussed at a future meeting.

### **Temporary Planning Permission for the Beacon**

There has been a recent request to erect a temporary beacon on Hilton Green to celebrate the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of VE day. Unfortunately the request did not leave enough time for the PC to seek temporary planning permission for such a structure. The PC has been advised by HDC that such permission is necessary.

### **Volunteer Group**

The Parish Council has a working group looking to draw on the many skills parishioners have within the village to undertake small maintenance jobs agreed by the Parish Council. If you would like to put forward your name for this group please advise the Clerk.

### **Next Meeting**

The next full meeting of the Parish Council will take place on Monday 1st June 2015 at 7.30pm at Hilton Village Hall. We would like to remind parishioners who intend to speak at any Parish Council meeting that it must be related to an agenda item published in advance.

## WEATHER WATCH

When I concluded my last article we had just had the first, and, as it subsequently turned out, only covering of snow during last winter. It was a nondescript season with no extremes, with broadly slightly above or slightly below average temperatures, maxima being generally within the range 5C (41F) and 8C (46.4F). The mildest day was 9th/10th January when even at night-time the temperature was 13.5C (56.3F). The coldest night was 22nd/23rd January when the temperature fell to -5.7C (21.8F). It was the sunniest winter since records began in 1929. Despite the unexceptional temperatures during the winter, spring started about two weeks later than normal.

March was a largely benign month, warmer, sunnier and drier than average. The warmest day was the 7th when the temperature reached 16.9C (62.4F). On the 13th after a winter without an easterly wind, the wind direction finally turned to that quarter. However, the mildness of the winter over much of Europe and especially Western Russia and Scandinavia meant that by then the wind was little more than chilly. The month ended with a Fen Blow, a ferocious north westerly gale with gusts up to 60mph accompanied by hail and rain showers. A couple of days later at the start of April, calm returned with hardly a breath of wind for eight days, a southerly drift bringing very high pollution from the near Continent mixed with dust from the Sahara. Apart from a slight shower on the 11th, the period from the 4th to the 24th was rainless. However, more unsettled conditions prevailed during the last week. April was a warm month, with daytime temperatures reaching 16C (60F) or above on fifteen days, making it the third warmest on record. The combination of cool nights, warm days and light winds, produced a delightful display of blossom and flowers this year as well as bringing the progress of spring growth back on schedule. According to the Met. Office, April this year was the sunniest since records began in 1929.

May has started on a more unsettled note bringing some welcome rain to our gardens, though the strength of the sun and wind soon dry out the surface. Unusually for May, gales blew for two days during the 5th and 6th with gusts over 50mph producing another Fen Blow. Calmer conditions returned in time for election day.

As usual I will finish with a couple of curios. The first concerns hail which tends to be rather more frequent at this time of the year. Fortunately, severe hailstorms are rare. Most last less than ten minutes. The largest hailstone known in Britain weighed 5oz. and fell during a storm over Horsham in Sussex on the 5th September 1958. Compare this with the heaviest single hailstone recorded worldwide, which weighed 1kg. (2.2lbs). It fell in Bangladesh on 14th April 1986 during a hailstorm which was reported to have killed 92 people.

The second relates to weather forecasting and the ability of creatures to anticipate the weather. For example, expect unsettled weather when ants travel in lines and fair weather when they scatter:

“If ants their walls do frequent build. Rain from the clouds will be spilled.”

Ants withdraw into their nests and busy themselves with their eggs before a storm.

Spiders also give clues.

Before rain or wind spiders fix their frame lines short. If they make them very long a lengthy fine spell can be expected. If a spider works during rain, it is an indication that the weather will soon be clear. Also, when the spider cleans its web, fine weather is indicated.



## FENSTANTON FOOTPATHS



Hawthorn

Imagine a large evergreen shrub in winter just after a blizzard with snow festooning the branches! At this time of year you would probably rather not but that is what the hawthorn has been like this May - only substitute gorgeous white hawthorn blossom for snow! It really has been a stunning display and it can be seen all over the place especially in the hedgerows and thickets alongside the parish footpaths (see photo 'Hawthorn'.) I had the pleasure of seeing this wonder of nature during a sunny but

cool early morning ramble on Ascension Day (14 May). My route took me to White Bridge by FP No 1\* and the Low Road then to the river (along FP No 8\*). Where FP No 8 joins the river there is a raised footbridge over Lake Brook from which there are magnificent views across the water meadows to St Ives with the Free Church spire prominent in the distance (see photo 'View'). After a brief stop to admire the view which included a large flock of geese grazing on the water meadows, I continued eastward along the riverside path (FP No 13\*) to the edge of Fen Drayton Nature Reserve. Rumour has it that a seal, spotted in the river at St Ives a few days ago, is still in the area but it did not oblige me with an appearance. Oh well, better luck next time! Surprising things often happen when you walk the parish footpaths.

The paths are in good walking condition at the time of writing (14 May). Vegetation is beginning to grow rapidly after a slow start due to dry weather in April but our maintenance contractor has just let

me know that he will be starting the first cut of the season in Fenstanton very shortly. Happy walking! Philip Blunt (P3 coordinator for Fenstanton)[email:



### **A few words from Charlie, our Under 15 Coach and Club Chairman**

I started this club one Saturday morning, nine years ago at the football field, with a handful of balls and a few jumpers to act as goal posts. Eighteen boys and one girl turned up, we now have 71 registered players and 15 more just training with us.

As all clubs do, we are no different, and we always need money to keep us going. With support from our parents and some very generous sponsors and donations from parish councils and local businesses, etc. we get by.

Unfortunately, I got ill this year and was hospitalised, I have had to undergo quite intensive treatment. During this treatment, I have received lots of blood and platelets, which I still need from time to time. I was amazed how much blood was used, not just for me, but loads of other people in one ward at Addenbrookes Hospital.

It came home to me how vitally important this precious life giving substance is and we, as human beings, can all help in keeping it going. Our blood and platelets could help to save any one of us at any time. Not just in certain treatments but in operating theatres, and keeping us alive after a serious Road Traffic Collision or other accidents. We will never know until we need it! So, Fenstanton Youth Football Club Committee decided our way of giving back to our supportive community was to actually give back. ## HILTON WI

The speaker for our May meeting was Sophia Mahroo, who explained how the care network in Cambridgeshire can be a valuable asset to a village community. This service has been in operation for about 30 years.

It was started by a vicar in Comberton, he started the first car scheme to take people to hospital appointments and other villages took up the idea. It is now funded by the NHS and has had a Lottery grant but still welcomes donations as it is a registered charity.

The service provided by this network does not replace statutory services, but enhances them by being the first point of call when help is needed and their volunteers can quickly point the person in the right direction to find long term help with: filling in forms, shopping, appointments, etc.

All the volunteers are CRB checked and trained by the network to spot any underlying problems, as often a call for a job to be done is really a call for a much needed chat, some company and the ever popular cup of tea and piece of cake.

Many people like to be independent but this scheme helps vulnerable people and their relatives live a

happier and more fulfilled lives by making them aware of all the good things still available in later life.

Over 300 people a month are helped by this service, which proves that a simple idea can, over time, become a countrywide resource.

It is available by contacting the local network in Hardwick. It only needs a phone call to set this process in motion, a volunteer will soon be sent and the problems sorted out. A lady in Hilton is a volunteer and would be pleased to hear from anyone who thinks they could spare some time to help people who are lonely or needing a bit of help.

## **Renewable Energy and Energy Efficiency - a view from the Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE)**

The CPRE in Cambridgeshire is confronting major development proposals which impact on our market towns, villages and countryside. The demand and location for thousands of new homes and major road schemes could result in the loss of Green Belt, attractive landscapes and some of the country's best high quality farmland.

There has been a huge increase in proposals for renewable energy developments. Whilst CPRE is broadly sympathetic to the need to reduce carbon emissions, we have to respond to vociferous concerns about the impact of on-shore wind turbines and solar farms which have an unacceptable impact on the landscape.

New research by Cambridge Architectural Research and Anglia Ruskin University, commissioned by CPRE, shows current Government policy may be misguided. It suggests we need a massive reduction in our energy requirements if we are to avoid inflicting widespread damage on the countryside.

Our Warm and Green report (<http://goo.gl/WFo2gg>) claims energy efficiency has been grossly underplayed in the approach to England's future energy supply.

The report highlights the potentially huge impact of infrastructure on the countryside if old and new homes remain energy inefficient, and illustrates the dearth of funding for improvements, especially in rural areas.

To meet the UK's carbon targets, one possible scenario would be to plant half of England with biomass crops, build 3,500 new wind turbines and install 8,000 hectares of new solar panels.

Researchers based in Cambridge looked at case studies from across the country to explore barriers to making energy improvements in rural buildings.

They found cost, the difficulty of finding skilled installers and payback time were problems too great for many people to overcome.

To ensure progress on reducing our energy demand, the report calls for:

- \* A bold national programme to reduce energy and carbon emissions from homes and community buildings
- \* The implementation of stronger zero carbon standards for new homes
- \* Rural communities to receive a fairer share of funding for energy efficiency.

Existing national programmes have failed to sufficiently reduce energy and carbon emissions. We must instead offer more persuasive and understandable financial incentives for all households. Such approaches would reduce both carbon emissions and energy bills, create jobs and help protect our landscapes.

# The Fenstanton Ferry?

(The picture is of the Holywell Ferry taken in 1914)

This month I am appealing for help with my research, probably from the older generation of Fenstantonians.

A few years ago I prepared for the annual village exhibition a collection of photographs and records of old Fenstanton pubs. Someone told me at the exhibition that I had one of them wrong and then went on to give me an interesting story



about the village ferry service. Unfortunately I am unable to remember who it was who spoke with me. His story went like this:

There was a pub in the old village where you could hire a horse and cart to take you to the ferry that ran between Fenstanton and St Ives meadow via Fen Lane. He said that the pub was once in Talls Lane by Chapel Green where a bungalow now stands. The pub was said to have burned down and been replaced by this bungalow.

Recently I have been researching the works of Gertrude Peet held at the Norris Museum and interestingly I found the following record written by her in 1922: “The ferry rights and profits belong to the **Fen Lane Inn**, an ancient Inn of the grants of the Ouse. A ferry charge is made for crossing the river, thus getting from the Fenstanton parish into Holywell, a village once noted for pilgrimage to the Holy Well in the church yard. It was reputed to have great healing powers. The traveller can escape the ferry toll, by indulging in a pint of beer; he is then ferried across the water free of charge”.

This would suggest to me that the pub was more likely to have been at the top of Fen Lane rather than in Talls Lane. Hence the name she quoted “Fen Lane Inn”. Miss Peet was writing in 1922 and she would have been taking the story directly from older village people. Most probably the ferry would have been running right up to the early years of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

The 1881 census shows that the Royal Oak was classed as being in Fen Lane and I wonder if the two Inns have been confused. The 1881 census records that the Royal Oak Inn was being run by a Sarah Joyce a widow aged 70.

Does anyone have any further information that they would like to share with me?
