Parish Council Report

HILTON

A number of residents have highlighted that Tythe Lane has flooded on several occasions over the winter. The Council has agreed to look into this matter.

The Council has received warm support from eight local communities to their proposals to jointly press the Highways Agency and its new design contractor to address common environmental issues. The A14 Action Group plans to call an early meeting with these villages to agree a common agenda for presentation to the Highways Agency.

The Parish Council hosted a very successful meeting in January to discuss items regarding management of The Green. This topic has excited considerable comment from residents. We thought that residents might like to see a summary of the meeting and this has been added at the end of this report.

The Council plans to clean the ponds at Graveley Way, the Crossroads and at Park farm in the coming autumn. In addition, there will be a programme of tree care in and around the Green over the coming weeks. Sadly the beech tree at the bend of the High Street is diseased and must be removed as part of this work.

The Council agreed to amend its investment policy for its reserve funds and details can be obtained from the Clerk.

Mr Bill Halford was recently co opted as a Parish Councillor. The Council also took the opportunity to remind residents that the Four- Yearly Parish Council Elections will be held this year, on 1 May. If you have always wanted to influence the way things work in Hilton why not put your name forward as a Councillor. Again, details can be obtained from the Parish Clerk.

**Summary of the Hilton Parish Meeting
Held in The Chapel on 14 January 2008
to Discuss Management of the Green**

Four Parish Councillors and 26 residents attended the meeting. A brief summary of the topics discussed is as follows

Introduction

The Council explained that the aim of the meeting was to inform residents, and to gather views, about the current and future plans for managing The Green. The Green had evolved over the years to meet the changing needs of the community and the maintenance needed to reflect these changes. Management has to balance sometimes contradictory objectives such as safety, amenity-use, drainage, wildlife, visual appearance, and cost. The majority of maintenance work on the Green was financed from the Precept and took up between a third and a half of the precept each year, depending on the work needed. The Council tried to limit rises in the Precept to be broadly in line with Council Tax.

Parking.

The Council discouraged parking on the grass of the Green. However, preventing occasional and temporary parking was difficult to enforce. The Council had therefore chosen to discourage parking by liaising with local interest groups and by the use of signs. The Council had also set up a pilot scheme using stakes, ropes and raised verges , but had received comments that the stakes and ropes were unsightly. They would be removed in the spring. There was some support for further raising the verges in places. There was some debate about the use of the car park at the Village Hall for non Village Hall activities.

Grass Cutting.

The Council's approach to grass cutting was to make the area available for recreational activities whilst preserving the unique appearance of the Green and the distinct variety of plant communities built up over the centuries. Some of the Green was cut for hay at no cost or profit to either the Council or the Common Rights Owners whilst the remainder was cut by residents, the cricket club and the contractor. All are requested to work under the direction of the Council's management plan.

In 2006, the regime for cutting the football pitch was amended so as to cut alternative halves of the pitch in successive years but this had drawn adverse comment from some residents who felt that the move threatened the cowslip population. There were a variety of views on the importance of the leisure facility versus the appearance of the Green and its flora..

Ditches and Borders

The Council explained that ditch maintenance work for 2008 had started. A number of residents were very concerned that enough was being done to ensure that the village drained properly and that the current cycle of ditch clearance was insufficient. The Council would consider their comments in reviewing the management plan.

Ponds.

The meeting was advised that the ponds required clearing on an 8-10 years cycle. The Council intended to clean all the ponds over the coming two years with funds drawn from reserves. Residents emphasized the need to ensure culverts and grills were kept free of debris and weed. There was agreement that some bulrushes should be retained in the Cross Roads pond to reduce blanket weed, but the coverage should be limited. The Council was also recommended to revisit the reports produced following the 2001 floods.

Trees

The Council explained that Hilton has a large number of very mature trees. These are managed so as to prolong their lives but sometimes had to be felled in the interests of safety. New trees are planted to replace those lost. The big beech on the corner of the High Street was severely infected by fungus and the Council had reluctantly decided to fell it as a safety measure. Some residents said that blackthorn was beginning to be a problem as were overhanging branches along the Wilderness.

Summary.

The Chairman thanked residents for attending and for highlighting all the various issues, all of which would receive full consideration.

Parish Council Report

Fenstanton

Police report.

During the period 9th January 2008 to 12th February 2008 the following incidents had been reported to the Police :-

1 of criminal damage, 1 of attempted burglary and 1 attempted theft from a motor vehicle.

The Parish Council has been advised that PC Finney (the Parish Community Beat Manager) has transferred to the Metropolitan Police. Details of his replacement will be advised once the appointment of a new Community Beat Manager has been made.

Dog fouling.

The Parish Council has been made aware that irresponsible and inconsiderate owners are allowing their dogs to foul in public areas, particularly on Headlands Park Play Area and the open space at Hampton Close. Dog owners are reminded that this practice is contrary to The Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005 and The Fouling of Land by Dogs (Huntingdonshire) Order 2007 and is subject to a fine. The Parish Council, therefore requests those allowing their dogs to foul in public areas and footpaths etc adopt a responsible attitude and clean up after their pets.

Whilst on the subject of dogs, there appears to be a trend in owners not keeping their dogs on leads in the Village and, indeed, a flippant attitude by some owners when confronted. This is also contrary to The Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005 and The Dogs on Leads (Huntingdonshire) Order 2007 and is subject to a fine.

If a more responsible attitude is not taken the Parish Council will have no alternative but to pursue the matter with the Dog Warden.

Parking on footpaths and greens.

The Parish Council has received complaints about the number of cars parking on footpaths. It is appreciated, with many households owning more than one vehicle, parking can be a problem to residents. However, parking on footpaths causes unnecessary problems for pedestrians particularly the disabled and parents with buggies. This is an issue that has been raised in Spectrum many times and seems to be ignored. It is requested that consideration is given to other members of the community when parking and one should not forget it is an offence to obstruct the footpath.

The greens within the Village are an integral part of the fabric of the Parish. It is, therefore, disappointing to see vehicles being parked on the greens on a more and more frequent basis. This is of, course, causing considerable damage particularly following the wet winter. Ultimately the costs for repairing the damage must be borne by the Parish Council and, therefore, Parishioners themselves through the precept.

Next Meeting.

The Annual meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on Thursday 13th March 7:30pm at Fenstanton and Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton. All members of the press and public are welcome.



Hilton WI

We were pleased to see so many of our members and guests at our February meeting to hear our usual monthly report. Several items of interest were raised including the suggestion that we could have “e-mail buddies” in order to notify any urgent items to our members. All those with e-mail access would be partnered with a member who does not have an e-mail address. This will be discussed further. Also the WI would be grateful for any unwanted sets of bookends for our book table.

We were later entertained by fellow Hilton resident, David Oliver, with tales of his time during 1984-1987 when he was an Accountant in Papua New Guinea, working for many varied clients including the government, gold mines, hotels, airlines, and a TV company. PNG (as it is known for short) is a group of islands north of Queensland, Australia and was named “Papua” which means “*frizzy hair*” by a Portuguese sailor who arrived in 1526. These islands belonged to many nations in the intervening years until independence was granted in 1975. There are many islands each with its own language, including Bougainville, whose language is called Rokotas and has the world’s shortest recorded alphabet - just eleven letters!

His enthusiasm for PNG was obvious as he showed us many interesting photos of the countryside, jungles, volcanoes and WW II plane wrecks! PNG has a tropical climate which is very hot and humid, it is also volcanic with earthquakes, tsunamis etc.

People have been discovered living in the remote highlands, and many are quite

primitive surviving by subsistence farming and living in grass huts. They spend much time woodcarving and he was given a Story Board when he left. This is a large wooden board carved and decorated in great detail to depict village life – David’s prized possession.

Papua New Guinea has fabulous fish and coral, and beautiful birds of paradise whose feathers are prized for use in head-dresses for tribal dances; but in contrast there are many snakes, huge spiders, crocodiles, cockroaches, etc. However, although it is a traditional, tranquil and beautiful place, a brutal savagery still exists there. The law and order problem currently prevents it being a popular tourist destination. David’s photos and amusing stories of times with expats (described as mercenaries, missionaries or misfits!) ended a fascinating insight into an unfamiliar part of the world.

At our next meeting on March 10th we look forward to hearing our speaker, Geoff Evans, talk to us about “The Life of a Racehorse”.

RSPB Fen Drayton Lakes Nature Reserve

Nature reserve enhancement works were held up during January's flooding. Our contractors are hopeful of completing their work to clear the self-seeded young willows from islands in Elney, Moore and Oxholme Lake soon, but that very much depends on a long spell of dry weather now.

Excavating the wader scrapes – shallow depressions - in the grassland between Ferry Mere and the River Great Ouse, has been delayed by the flooding too. There has been much interest in this area for birdwatchers, with the appearance of about 2000 black-tailed godwits, wading birds that appreciate the shallow floods and wet fields in wide, open landscapes at this time of year.

Now that we have seen for ourselves what winter flooding can be like, we can easily visualise what many people had previously told us, and we can begin to think about long-term plans for structures such as visitor centre, viewpoints and surfaced footpaths.

The Fen Drayton Lakes volunteer team has built two otter holts, which we hope will encourage these much-loved mammals to become permanent residents in the lakes. As any natural holt in the banks of a lake is liable to flooding, the new holts have been built on floating rafts. The team will also be building rafts for nesting common terns – these birds will nest on the bare islands, but those that choose to nest on the rafts will have a better chance of succeeding if summer flooding occurs.

As usual, it looks as if the Oscars will be competing with us once again for the attention of the Press and publicity media. The Academy of Box Brownie Clickers must know by now that to hold their mutual adoration extravaganza during the run-up to Hilton Cricket Club's AGM is doomed to failure. Just look through this issue of *Spectrum* to see how much space is devoted to HCC and how much to the Oscars. In case your diary didn't come with the AGM date already printed, mark it now: 8.00 p.m. on Wednesday 12th March. Cancel all other engagements and prepare to spend an hour or so with us in a cold, dimly lit pavilion. Bring your own fly-spray.

In the meantime, it will be apparent to everyone passing our cricket ground that we have recently signed up an ace fielder, called *Talpa europaea*.
