Working with carers

I am really pleased to announce that we were recently awarded Surgery of the Month by Carers Trust. This was for our work in promoting assistance for unpaid carers. We are working hard to increase awareness of the facilities and assistance available to carers who can sometimes feel really isolated. Our carers course is currently underway in Fenstanton on Thursday afternoons and participants tell me that they are really enjoying it. We may well run this again later in the year so if anyone is interested in a future course please get in touch with me at the surgery.

Patient Reference Group

Do you have a spare couple of hours every 6 - 8 weeks? If so would you consider joining our patient reference group? This group assists the practice by meeting with us on a regular basis and giving us feedback from the patients' point of view. We in turn provide the group with data and information about how the surgery is performing. We would really like this group to be more representative of our patient population and therefore we would love to hear from parents of young children, from those in full time employment who perhaps rarely attend the surgery as well as those who use the surgery and its facilities regularly. It is not a requirement to attend every meeting and we are trying to vary the days and times to assist those who work. Our next meeting is planned for 5th March and will be held during the day, but the following one is on 28th April at 6.00 pm. If you think you could help or would like further information please give me a call at the surgery or send an email.

Friends and Family Test

Have you heard about the Friends and Family Test? This consists of one question which gives us a snapshot about how we are performing. Folk Lore of Fenstanton

(2) A Headless Woman on a Donkey

April 1922

“The phantom of a headless woman and a donkey (some say a white donkey, Mrs Richards, Fenstanton) are to be met along the top end of Talls Lane and Church Street as far as the corner. Some villagers conclude that this spectra of a headless woman points to some dreadful murder or tragedy that took place between these two points probably many years ago. Still this certainly is accepted as a true fact, though as far as is known it is just a tale of the past. The tale has been verbally handed down to those living in Fenstanton.”

(3) Laying a Witch

Scene, the bungalow cottages (unable to identify the location of these cottages), told by Mrs Armon April 1922:

“Yes, she (Mrs Cade) always used to come to tea with us (Mrs Armon) always after Hellie (I assume to be a child but could have been a pet, John Deeks) was bewitched; she used to bring a quarter of a pound of tea. I could never do anything with Hellie when she left.

“So Mrs Richards told me how to break the spell and I did it and was never troubled again. Yes, she told me to lay a knife, blade edge outwards towards the street and facing under the door mat. I did it when she came, that did her, and Hellie was not bewitched that time and never once cried after she went. That stopped her pranks, no, she never troubled us again.”

A14: The Planning Inspectorate has approved the project for examination and The Highways Agency will be holding an exhibition at the village hall on Saturday 28th February from 9am to 7pm. It will be possible to view hard copies of the DCO application submitted to the Planning Inspectorate.

The Parish Council A14 WG is working through the 700+ documents and will publish our findings and recommendations shortly.

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Trees and Ditches: This work has now been completed. The Parish Council will be reviewing the outstanding works list over the coming months to establish what needs attending to in the next financial year.

Precept: We have been advised by Huntingdon District Council that the Parish Council's request for a precept of £27,070 for the financial year 2015/16 has been approved. Based on an electorate of 816 (as at the Parish Council election on 4 July 2013) this equates to an average of 9.5p per elector per week.

Speedwatch: Councillor Justo Perez is seeking new volunteers for the speedwatch scheme which is being re-launched. If you would like to be involved please contact our Clerk who will be able to advise you of the requirements of the scheme.

We were advised that a monitor had been installed on the Potton road for the period 11th January to 18th January (1500-1500). A summary of the results provided to us indicated 28308 vehicles in total.

2270 of those were commercial vehicles over 2 and under 3m long (vans)

1696 vehicles over 3m long (HCV)

15890 recorded between 30-39 mph

2044 recorded between 40-49 mph

210 recorded between 50-59 mph

7 recorded between 60-69 mph

The recorded vehicles in excess of the ACPO guidelines for prosecution (above limit + 10% + 2mph i.e. 36mph) was 36.02%

Highest speed recorded 67 mph 0137 Wed 13th Jan 2015.

As over 1/3rd of vehicles were shown as being in excess of the guidelines for prosecution we have asked the constabulary to undertake some actual detection work in the village and have also asked for more information regarding the timing of large vehicles through the village.

Village Volunteering Initiative : Councillors Goodridge, Perez and Perry are forming a working group to look at projects that might be undertaken across the village and how any willing volunteers in the village may be able to assist.

Next Meeting: The next full meeting of the Parish Council is taking place on Monday 2nd March 2015 at 7.30 pm at Hilton Village Hall. We would like to remind parishioners who intend to speak at any Parish Council meeting that it must be related to an agenda item published in advance.

WEATHER WATCH

What a year we experienced in 2014. According to the Met. Office it was the warmest year on record with eleven of the twelve months having above average temperatures. Only August was rather cool. Last Autumn was largely unspectacular. The first air frost occurred on 6 November. The weather pattern in December started in a similar way to December 2013 with rapid changes from day to day, the occasional chilly day interspersed with mild ones. This resulted in several days having their highest temperature during the night. After a very mild week prior to Christmas the only cold spell of 2014 occurred in the last week with four consecutive days failing to reach 5C (41F), marking the cessation of growth and the traditional onset of winter. During the year Gillian Shiell has been giving me her rainfall figures for each month which resulted in the total for 2014 being 639.20mm (25.2 inches).

The start of 2015 produced a stormy mild spell of weather. While northern parts of Britain experienced winds over 100mph, most of East Anglia escaped lightly. The overall temperature in January was close to average, made up of 10 mild days, 10 cold days and the rest close to average. Air frost occurred on 10 days, the coldest night being the 23rd when the temperature fell to -5.7C (21.8F). Precipitation in January totalled 46.5mm (1.83 inches). As the end of January approached there had been no snow in Hilton for almost 2 years. A small boy was heard asking his Dad "When will I be able to use the sledge Father Christmas gave me (in 2013)?" A week or so later some wet snow fell in Hilton on the 29th and again on the 31st but failed to settle, although in more hilly parts locally some lying snow could be seen. Then on 2nd February heavy snow showers provided, albeit briefly, a winter wonderland scene, though much of it had thawed by lunchtime on the 3rd.

So why has snow become such a rarity in East Anglia? The main reason is the positioning of high pressure. During the last two winters, there have been no anticyclones over Scandinavia, and this has resulted in almost a total lack of easterly winds which are the main source of snow and low temperatures for us. Even winds of polar origin have become westerly or even south westerly by the time they reach here. As a consequence, whilst we have had a number of chilly days this winter, all have reached at least 3C (37F) with only mostly slight night frosts, apart from three nights.

I will finish as usual with a couple of curios. The first concerns snow. As quite small falls in Britain tend to cause transport chaos and many schools to be closed, spare a thought for a place called Tamarack in California where the lying snow in March 1911 measured 1146cm (37 feet 6 inches) deep.

As Spring approaches the second relates to another couple of weather cocktails:

Springtime: Pineapple juice, peach flavoured

Moonlight Cup: Apple juice, calvados, sugar, ginger ale and 1 slice of lemon

Thank you Mrs Sly for a very entertaining talk.



FENSTANTON FOOTPATHS

The new A14 is coming! Or so it seems. The Direct Consent Order (DCO) for the new project was submitted by the Highways Agency and accepted by The Secretary of State for Transport at the end of January 2015. What has this to do with Fenstanton footpaths, I hear you ask? Well, that's a good question but, in fact, it does have an impact on Footpath No 14* to Conington on the south side of the existing A14. Under the new scheme this footpath will be diverted. As far as I can tell from the scheme plans the diverted footpath will run alongside the realigned Conington Road for the full length of the diversion including the road bridge to be built over the new A14. Official Highways Agency notices have been posted on the fingerpost for this footpath so now is the time to register your comments if you have any. This can be done by visiting the following website: <http://infrastructure.planningportal.gov.uk/projects/eastern/a14-cambridge-to-huntingdon-improvement-scheme/?ipcsection=docs> . You can also look at the plans there but there are 787 documents included in the DCO so they take some finding. The one I found most useful was document No 728 entitled A14 2.02 General Arrangement Plan Sheet 12 of 24. You have until 12 March to register any representations.

The new scheme also has a minor effect on Footpath No 7* which runs from West End Farm to the Potton Road. It looks as though there will be a new footpath alongside the diverted Potton Road which will connect the end of this footpath to the Hemingford Grey footpath network so I guess this could be considered a benefit as there is currently no footpath alongside the Potton Road. Details for this are shown on General Arrangement Plan Sheet 11 of 24.

If anyone has any concerns about the effect of the A14 on our parish footpaths please contact me and I will endeavour to channel them to the Parish Council.

HILTON WI

Our January meeting was very well attended. Neil Callan talked about and showed us his collection of silver spoons. He was very knowledgeable on the subject and brought along some of his own collection. Not all "silver" spoons are silver. There are three kinds of metals used, Sheffield plate which is made from a sandwich of rolled silver and copper, electroplate (EPNS) using base metal dipped in a silver salt solution through which an electric current is passed. It fuses the metal and silver together and a very small amount of copper added to it.

This mixture is 925 parts silver, 75 parts copper which is added to strengthen it.

Silver has been used for centuries for decorative pieces and also for coinage. Oliver Cromwell confiscated a large amount of silverware to melt down for coins, but when the Reformation came the coins were turned back into beautiful silver objects. When coins were introduced the practice of "clipping" (removing small quantities of silver) became very popular. The next step was to put a milled edge on coins which they still have today. Spoons have not changed very much over the

centuries, the wealthy people had the backs of their spoons decorated with pictures of their estate or castle and would set them out, at dinner, upside down to show them off. Some had handles twisted like barley sugar, they were varied from county to county, different shapes and sizes. One interesting item was quite small and had small piercings in the bowl we were told it was a tea strainer with a difference, it was used to sieve out "undesirable" stuff from the tea unloaded from the Tea Clippers when tea was packed in barrels. Rats were frequently found in the barrels. Thankfully we do not need spoons like that now!


