In a building of this age, there are always heavy repair costs and, this year, the money raised is not only going to help with this but also with improving the facilities that the church can offer.

Community Car Scheme

The Scheme works by matching passengers with volunteer drivers who use their own cars to take them to hospital appointments, shopping or even to visit friends and relations. Passengers pay the drivers 40p a mile based on the driver's mileage, to cover the driver's expenses, plus a £1 booking fee which the driver passes on to the office to cover administration costs.

The Scheme is primarily there for essential journeys to the doctors and hospitals and these will always be acted on first however, we will also look at social drives, to the shops, hairdressers etc.

The more drivers we have the more we can help your community. Could you become a volunteer driver and help your neighbours in this way? We understand that as a volunteer you may be concerned about how much time you can commit. Even if you can only offer one drive per week, this would be a help, and there is no obligation to accept a drive. No experience is necessary, just common sense and a sympathetic attitude. Support and guidance is always available from our friendly office. Please note that all applicants will be subject to a DBS check and satisfactory references will be required.

On Saturday 2nd November at 11am at St Peter and St Paul, Fenstanton, you are welcome to come along to our parish service for All Souls' Day. This year we will be having heart shapes to write the names of those we are remembering, during the service, and whose names will be read out. Although a steady trickle of German prisoners found their way into POW camps in Britain from 1939 to mid-1943, it was not until the Allied victories in North Africa and later, after the invasion of Normandy, that the camps in Britain started to fill up with German, Polish, Italian and Ukrainian prisoners of war. In 1946, the year after the end of World War 2, more than 400,000 prisoners of war were still being held in Britain. Of these there were over 120,000 German POWs who had been shipped to the UK from the USA at the request of the UK's new Prime Minister, Clement Attley. Attley had decided that the POWs would help with the re-building of the UK after the devastation of the Blitz. In this he was opposed by many members of parliament and the church, but he resisted all calls to free the prisoners.

The prisoners were set to work rebuilding houses (hence the term 'Gerry Built', the name for a poorly built house,), but the vast majority of prisoners were set to working on the land. The last prisoners were not released until November 1948. The camps where the POWs were imprisoned have largely (but not all) disappeared. At one time hundreds of them were spread across the UK.

Life in a British POW camp was not easy but compared to other nations British treatment of POWs was on the whole fair. A strange aspect of life in a British prison camp was the fact that prisoners received the same amount of daily rations as British servicemen, which was more than the civilian population received. So in effect the POWs were better fed than the civilian population of Britain! They were also paid a 1/- (10p) a day and the farmer had to make a payment to the war office, sum unknown.

During WW2 it was by no means uncommon for German and Italian servicemen to be seen in and around Fenstanton. Although not guests of the village by choice, they would seem to have a way of life which was in general far from unpleasant. Our nearest POW camp was in Hemingford Abbots and from there the prisoners were transported each day to work in and around Fenstanton.

The End of WW2: From 1946 onwards some prisoners were on their way back home, mostly the sick and disabled men. The last repatriations took place in November 1948 but many prisoners did not want to return to Germany as their hometown was now in the Soviet Union sector. Fearing another spell of imprisonment in Soviet hands, they decided to stay in Britain where they became known as "DPs" or Displaced Persons. Some of the prisoners from Hemingford married local girls and stayed in Britain where many of their decedents still live today.

The opportunity to mix with local people was given to the POWs after November 1946 when the fraternising law was relaxed. Christmas that year could be spent with a local family and regular visits would be made to present local children with toys that had been carved from wood during their spare time. By all accounts there was little animosity towards the prisoners who by this time had become a familiar sight in Fenstanton. There are still some in the village who remember the prisoners who worked in the village and surrounding farms. So when did the camp at Hemingford close down? These are two extracts from the local newspapers.

17 Mar 1947

"In the still of this morning's sunshine there was graphic evidence all over the county of the devastation caused by last night's gales which produced tornado-like gusts screaming over the countryside at a velocity of 99 mph. A tree fell across a Prisoner of War hut and Hemingford Abbots and seriously injured the occupants". Shortly after, one of the POWs died of his injuries.

23 Feb 1948

"Typhoid has been reported at Hemingford Grey Prisoner of War camp".

It was immediately after this outbreak that the camp was closed. One remaining camp hut can still be seen on the London Road St Ives, by the old farm house on the right heading towards the A14.

Here are some memories from local residents. "One thing you might be interested in is the fact that we had two German POW's working on our farm, as I suspect did other local farms. They were transported from where they were housed in huts in Hemingford. My mum would give them a cup of tea! We enjoyed the time they spent with us. When they left they presented my dad with a walking stick carved from wood from the hedgerow. Some POW's stayed on and married local girls".

"POWs worked on farms and the blacksmith's forge (now Mo's Motors). The forge was later sold to a Polish POW"

"We have no recollection of the POW's we had coming into the house although our mum used to make them cups of tea and give them hot water to make their own drink. However we were always allowed to chat with them, in fact I would say encouraged to. This must have been before (November) 1946!

"Our dad also let the POW's keep any hens eggs they found (our hens had the freedom of the farm and would lay their eggs where they thought fit!). They were often eaten raw or cooked in an old saucepan. So yes, we did fraternise with the POW's when it was illegal".

NMU

The final report has been received by the Council and the working group are reviewing the information to advise the Council regarding the next steps.

Speedwatch

The Speedwatch group are still looking for more volunteers who will need to undertake training at Police HQ (Huntingdon). Speedwatch provides the Police with valuable data regarding speeding vehicles which enables them to assess the scale of this major issue within our village. Playground

The installation of the playground equipment is almost complete. The turf has been laid and the rubber matting laid over it. The turf will need some time to establish and knit around the matting. The fencing is due to be fitted in late October and the Council has approved the expenditure for a new wooden gate. Please note that the playground is not open at this time and has not been certified as safe so the Council would like to request that all parishioners stay outside of the safety barriers.

Autumn fruit: Why aren't we making use of nature's bounty?

Blackberry picking is so much part of my autumn calendar that I have been surprised to see so many unpicked this year. On a country walk recently with a visitor from afar, a friend was surprised when her guest stopped to ask who owned all this fruit gesturing to the luscious black berries. When told they were common property he was astonished, saying that in his homeland the bushes would have been stripped bare. Later he eyed her beautiful marmalade cat and asked "what is the significance of this small animal?"

The inference we can draw from this anecdote is that harsher terrain affects food choice and availability, thus pets may be a bizarre luxury and any free food is snapped up. Humans have been consuming blackberries for thousands of years. As we know, acid in peat act as a preservator.

When a prehistoric body from 2,500 B.C. was found in a bog in Denmark, one of many tests carried out was to examine the stomach contents. Haraldsvaar Woman had been eating blackberries before she died, though it should be added they were not the cause of death!

Blackberrying is or was evocative of ripeness and nostalgia: an end of summer activity, when the days are still long, the sun still bright but change is coming, school holidays are drawing to a close and the carefree days are about to end. Many associate the picking with childhood. Seamus Heaney grew up on a farm in Ireland. His poem on blackberrying is autobiographical, telling of the compulsive picking of the fruit, filling "can after can" with his brothers whose boots became "bleached" in the wet grass. As a child he was struck by the jewelled beauty of the fruit and wanted to keep them. The grey mould which grew after only a short period was a huge disappointment and the poem suggests that here was a lesson on impermanence.

The fruit is better picked on a sunny day. After heavy rain the fruit loses some of its sweetness. It is also best harvested before the 11th October. There is a tale that when Lucifer was cast out of heaven he landed on a blackberry bush and in revenge spoilt its taste following the anniversary of his fall. The truth is we are likely by that date to have had greater rainfall, certainly less daylight and even a frost. All of which dilute or destroy the lovely flavour.

Although keen on making jam, I never make bramble jelly. Instead I cook the fruit gently with sugar, then sieve it. Pots of black puree go into the freezer to make blackberry fool for family or friends throughout the following year. It has an intense flavour and when combined with custard or cream or both, makes a delicious dessert. Also, so that crumbles and tarts can have a taste of summer, I freeze some berries on trays so that the berries stay whole and separate.

Of course detractors might point to the damage to skin and clothing caused when harvesting, since thorns are so well designed they cling and pierce. I think the scratches are worth it. Character emerges on a fruit picking excursion. There are the wimps who wince at every scratch, the super careful who shield their hands and clothing, the over ambitious who always want the beautiful fruit that is just out of reach, and the dissemblers who pretend their bag is full.....there was also our three year old boy who simply took the fruit skilfully from everyone else's buckets as they scanned and reached. Fortunately this has not turned into a lasting character trait!

If you have very young children nettles and brambles can be a hazard of course, but there is a solution: plant a thornless bush or two in your garden to grow along a fence or wall or wire. The variety Loch Ness has one of the Royal Horticultural Society's Awards of Garden Merit. Harvesting would then be swift, easy and painless.

An Upgraded Welcome Area

Regular readers may remember that we had planned and scheduled a series of improvement works around our car park and welcome area. We are now happy to report that the contractors have been in and carried out these works, made possible by a grant from the A14 Community Fund, a fund managed by Cambridgeshire Community Foundation.



A new surface has been laid to renew the worn out stretch of road adjacent to the welcome area and into the car park, which has been levelled out and had a second disabled parking space added. A clearly demarcated pedestrian route has also been added from the welcome area, across the road and down to the water's edge at the small picnic area opposite the welcome shelter looking out over Ferry Lagoon.

Why not come down one day this winter to make use of the improvements and then go for a walk around one of the lakes? At the time of writing the vanguard of wintering species has started arriving, so it is only a matter of time before they arrive en masse. It won't be long before large flocks of wintering thrushes, such as redwing and fieldfare, from northern Europe will be visiting the hawthorn scrub along the access road and around the lakes. Wigeon, a grazing species of duck with a tell-tale whistling call, will be around the lakes and large numbers of waders, particularly lapwing, will be moving around the muddy lake edges and surrounding fields. There will always be something to see.
