# An update from Fen Drayton Lakes

Visitors to Fen Drayton Lakes between spring and autumn will likely have seen at least one of the cattle herds grazing around some of the reserve lakes. This grazing is one of the most important tools at our disposal for managing our wetland habitats and mimics the actions of large, native herbivores that would once have been common.

Cattle eat by wrapping their tongues around grasses and other vegetation and pulling it up in clumps. This creates an uneven, patchy sward consisting of tussocks and differing plant heights. They are also good at trampling the lake edges to create mud and small pools and pushing their way through denser scrub to create open areas. By grazing the wet grassland around the lakes with cattle we provide suitable nesting habitat for breeding waders such as lapwing and redshank, as well as maintaining the areas for wintering waders and wildfowl.

#### **Interesting sightings**

September is always a good month for bird watching with many migratory species on the move. Regular birders at Fen Drayton Lakes were rewarded for their efforts this year with several good sightings including whinchat, spotted flycatcher, wheatear, redstart, wryneck and osprey.

Away from the briefly seen migrants, wintering species are starting to build up with wigeon and teal once more on site. Bittern have also been seen more regularly on Elney and in flight between lakes.

# Fenstanton and the USA: Part 2:

During the voyage of the Mayflower, there was a turbulent storm during which John Howland fell overboard. He managed to grab

a topsail halyard that was trailing in the water and was safely hauled back on-board. John's survival was a stroke of luck for his millions of descendants, (some living today) including; Presidents George Bush and George W. Bush, Barbara Bush, Anthony Perkins, Chevy Chase and Humphrey Bogart. It is suggested by historians that currently there are over ten million living descendants of the fifty-one Mayflower Pilgrims who survived and had children.



On 11th November 1620, as the ship lay at anchor in Cape Cod Bay, John Howland was the thirteenth man to sign the 'MAYFLOWER COMPACT' agreement. It agreed to pass 'just and equal laws for the good of the colony'. Some US scholars even see this as a kind of American Magna Carta and a template for the Declaration of Independence, although the compact started with a declaration of loyalty to King James! This laid the foundation for the new town that the able-bodied men on board the Mayflower planned to create when the group landed in what was to become Plymouth, Massachusetts.

After arriving at their destination, in the space of several months, almost half the passengers perished in the cold, harsh, unfamiliar New England winter. The Carver family, with whom John Howland lived, survived the terrible sickness of the first winter, during which many Pilgrims died.

However the following spring, on an unusually hot day in April, Governor Carver, came out of his cornfield feeling ill. He passed into a coma and "never spoke more." His wife, Kathrine, died soon after her husband. Since the Carvers had no children, John Howland is thought to have inherited their estate.

On or about the 25 March 1623, John Howland married his fellow Mayflower passenger, Elizabeth Tilley. Elizabeth, also from Huntingdonshire was the youngest child of a silk-weaver named John Tilley and his wife Joan. She was the only child of her parents recorded as going with them to America. At the time of her marriage she was not quite sixteen years of age. Together John and Elizabeth had ten children.

John Howland had several brothers two of whom later went to New England and whose descendants include both Presidents Richard Nixon and Gerald Ford and Prime Minister of the United Kingdom, Winston Churchill.

Work is progressing well: Cutback of hedges and bushes completed Order for Bridleway confirmed. Will convert 19.10.20 Surface grading work has started – likely to last 3 to 4 weeks (weather permitting)





Signage (prohibiting vehicle access) has been completed at the village end. Official 'bridleway' signage will go in once the legal process is completed in about two weeks. Weather permitting, work will be completed this year

A detailed survey on the condition of the existing bus shelters has been undertaken. Work on the refurbishment will commence shortly. The feasibility of an additional shelter by the Clock Tower is being considered.

# Hamptons Playing Field and car park

Your council is undertaking a consultation on how best to upgrade the whole area to provide a leisure resource for the whole village, as well as increase security and reduce vandalism.

# Chequer Street Car Park lighting

New LED lighting will be installed to replace the old, obsolete lights.

# Bins and rubbish

An upgraded emptying program is being rolled out to support the deployment of new bins around the village.

# Underpass

The graffiti will be cleaned off and the surfaces treated with new anti-graffiti paint. Further measures to improve usability, security and appearance are being considered.

Early feedback has provided a wide variety of ideas and options, which your Parish Council will look to evaluate and take forward, in conjunction with CCC, ...but we still need more!

A number of early interventions have already been taken:

# **Chequer Street parking**

An application under the Local Highways Initiative (LHI) has been submitted to CCC to put parking bays where there is currently parking on the verge and pavement.

# Traffic and speed in the High Street

Following analysis of data collected from the recent deployment of the Speedwatch equipment, your Parish Council has submitted a formal request to CCC for an initial investigation to evaluate the feasibility and total cost of a speed reduction to 20mph along the High Street.



# White lines and markings

CCC will commence work shortly to repaint all road lines and markings along the High Street.

# We need your help

Please continue to let us know about any traffic related incidents, including inconsiderate or dangerous parking, HGVs parking in or taking short-cuts through the village, abandoned vehicles or speeding 'hotspots'.

# Huntingdon - road openings

Work at the Godmanchester/ Huntingdon end of the A1307 (old A14) is progressing well with the opening of a link road to the ring road scheduled for 31st October.

Work to remove the viaduct and work around the train station, together with the opening of a link road to bye-pass Godmanchester are all on or ahead of schedule.



# Village Pond and Clock Tower



A detailed survey of the work needed to repair and upgrade the pond, clock tower and surrounding area is underway.

Work will commence on the clearing/upgrade of the pond, new fencing and the installation of replacement bollards around the clock tower in mid-November. The entire program will also see the repainting, cleaning and repair of the internal and external aspects of the Grade 2 listed building, to include new lighting and signage; the installation of new benches and tables, as well as the restoration of the historic Whipping Post.

#### Local Walks A 4.5-mile Circular Walk:

Leave Hilton on the B1040, from Cross Farm Close, along the cinder path past The Paddocks. Cross over to the new path and walk over the A14. Stay on this side of the B1040 and follow the new footpath sign to the left. It runs back parallel to the B1040 and when you reach the new A14 turn right *picture 1* –(there are two footpath signs) to follow the fence along a grassy bank. There are pools and bulrushes on the right, and the A14 is on your left.





There is a large gap in the

fence and a concrete bridge. Turn right and go through the gap. If you look back you will see the large "Public footpath" sign which the farmer has placed for walkers who are taking the route in the opposite direction. *Picture 2.* 

Walk away from the A14, passing a waymarker with arrows in both directions, until you come to another sign placed by the farmer and at this point turn left.

Picture 3.

If you spot another sign on your right, near the trees, it says "Private property" so don't walk towards it! Carry on along the path and you will reach the footpath which links Hilton to Hemmingford Gray. Turn left and go past Topfield farm along Mere Way. Proceed over the A14 again, *picture 4,* past another sign indicating the Bridle path to The Offords. Further on, the track is signposted showing a left turn at the bend, (don't go into Lattenbury Farm), walk through a copse and then





turn left. At a small bridge, turn right to return to Graveley Way. On reaching the road you can turn left to walk back to the crossroads in Hilton, or take the footpath slightly to the left and on the opposite side of the road to reach Chapel Close, and then the B1040, nearly opposite to the shop and The Prince of Wales pub.

### Report from the Meeting of the Council dated Monday 5th October 2020

#### Trim Trail Survey

Hilton Parish Council would like to thank those parishioners who completed their recent survey regarding a trim trail. A copy of the survey results are available on the website (www.hiltonparishcouncil.com) and a summary is below:

Would you support a trim trail in the village?

Yes – 48% No – 52%

How often would you use it?

Daily – 8% Weekly – 19% Monthly – 7% Not at all – 68% Would you support the cost of the trail coming from the PC precept if alternative

funding cannot be found?

Yes – 34% No – 66%

#### Would you support the equipment to be placed in the Wilderness?

Yes – 38% No – 62%

Considering these results, the Parish Council have resolved to take this proposal no further.

#### Website

The new accessibility compliant website is now live and can be viewed at <u>www.hiltonparishcouncil.com</u>.

#### **Emergency Traffic Regulation Order (ETRO)**

At the meeting of the Cambridgeshire County Council's Highways and Transport Committee, the members discussed the request to include a 24-hour HGV ban on the B1040 through Hilton in their latest batch of ETROs. The decision of the Committee was: It was unanimously resolved:

a) To ask Officers to take away the B1040 Lorry ban proposal and consult with the Department of Transport for further consideration of whether it, and any further schemes ,are appropriate for inclusion in the current tranche 2 list, with any final decision on the B1040 proposal, to be in consultation with the Vice Chairman, with the involvement of Councillor Harford.

The Parish Council has since received the response from the Department of Transport to state that officers spoke to the relevant team in the DfT, and confirmed that this proposal would not be compliant with the EATF (Emergency Active Travel Fund) guidance, and would not therefore be eligible for funding from the EATF.

Further information was received from Cambridgeshire County Council: The root of the problem with this proposal in the context of the EATF is in relation to the statutory guidance for local authorities at https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/ reallocating-road-space-in-response-to-covid-19-statutory-guidance-for-local-authorities, which sets out the expectations of government and the types of measures that they expect to see coming forward with the funding that they have provided.

The "Reallocating road space: measures" section of the guidance starts "Local authorities in areas with high levels of public transport use should take measures to reallocate road space to people walking and cycling, both to encourage active travel and to enable social distancing during restart... ... Local authorities where public transport use is low should be considering all possible measures." It then goes on to list the types of measures that can be implemented from the EATF. Limited restrictions to vehicular access such as HGV bans are not included on this list. The expectation is that measures to improve conditions for cyclists on road will reallocate road space with physical segregation, or very significantly reduce vehicular traffic by use of measures such as modal filters that prohibit through movements by all motor vehicles.

The emergency procedures document sets out amendments to the procedures for Traffic Regulation Orders in the context of implementation of schemes under the EATF. It does not add to or amend the statutory guidance. The third bullet you note is applicable to proposals covered by the statutory guidance that would need a Traffic Regulation Order to restrict traffic, such as a modal filter or bus gate. It does not broaden the guidance to cover any traffic restriction that would require an order.

In terms of the underlying reason that this type of intervention is not included in the guidance, the EATF is expecting local authorities to "make significant changes to their road layouts to give more space to cyclists and pedestrians." An HGV ban does not do this, and leaves the majority of traffic on the B1040, meaning the benefit to cyclists is marginal at best. It does not reallocate road space, segregate cycle movements or significantly reduce vehicular traffic. Other potential benefits of an HGV ban on the B1040 locally are not covered by the aims of the EATF funding.

The above does not remove the local imperative to look for ways to improve traffic conditions in Hilton, but it does confirm that DfT do not consider that the EATF would be an appropriate funding source for measures needed to implement an HGV ban. I hope that this clarifies the position in relation to the EATF.

Thank you to those parishioners who wrote to the County Council in support of this action.

#### 2021/22 Local Highways Improvement Bid

The bid to request a 24-hour traffic regulation order to prohibit heavy commercial vehicles on the B1040 through Hilton has been submitted.

#### A14 Legacy Fund

Parishioners may remember that the Parish Council were successful in their bid for works to improve the ponds at both Reeve Ditch and the Ware in Graveley Way. Design work is continuing on these projects and the Parish Council hope to receive a detailed programme of works this month.

#### Streetlights

The Clerk continues to receive reports of streetlights in the village that are not working correctly. In most cases, the lighting maintenance contractor can repair these lights quickly. Unfortunately, they were unable to repair PC4 at the corner of Westbrook and New England and the Parish Council have resolved to replace this lantern with a new LED lantern. If you notice any streetlights in the village that are not working correctly, please report them to the Clerk (clerk@hiltonparishcouncil.com) together with the number on the streetlight which will start with the letters "PC".

#### **Planning for Future White Paper**

The Ministry for Housing, Communities and Local Government has opened consultations on a white paper regarding the planning system. Hilton Parish Council have resolved to send a detailed response to this consultation.

#### **Bonfire Service**

As they will not be holding the traditional annual bonfire and fireworks night, Hilton Parish Council have resolved to offer a bonfire service to those parishioners that rely on the bonfire to dispose of their garden waste. Further information will be available on the Parish Council website, Facebook page and the noticeboards.

#### **Christmas Lights**

Hilton Parish Čouncil have resolved to spend up to £200 to place Christmas lights on the cricket pavilion. The Council would like to encourage parishioners to make a special effort with their Christmas lights this year in the absence of the traditional community events.

#### Parish Plan

A working group has been formed to review the action points from the 2005 Parish Plan.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> November 2020 via Zoom. Agendas will be issued in advance on the village notice boards and the Council's website <u>www.hiltonparishcouncil.com</u>. Parishioners are welcome to speak at council meetings on agenda items.

#### **Hilton Produce Show**

#### **Autumn Bliss**

Year-round interest? Do our gardens tick that box? What can we enjoy in the Autumn garden? It is, of course, a rather hit and miss affair with the variable conditions we experience. Nonetheless there are a few sure-fire winners. Even on this gloomy day in October there are roses and dahlias in profusion. A rose called Bonica is amazingly floriferous and has been so throughout the summer with only the briefest of rests in August. Dahlias with their deep colours and velvety petals delight us until the frosts come. We now leave them to over winter in the ground tucked in with a generous helping of mulch. Salvia Amistaad is still showing its deep purple flowers in the herbaceous bed and Michaelmas Daisies, specifically Aster Frikarti Munch, are adding further splashes of colour.

However, the plant of the moment in our garden is the Nerine. These bulbs don't begin to bloom until Autumn and carry on into December if the situation is to their liking. There is a pot of white ones in clear view from the kitchen window. Slender and elegant, their white heads nod like swans, while droplets cling to the arching

leaves and gleam when the sun shines through. Like all white flowers, they glow in the dark which is another bonus of these intrepid blooms.





**Pink** Nerine Bowdenii are the most widely known and commonly planted of these bulbs. They are also known as Guernsey Lilies. A shipment of the bulbs was lost in a storm near The Channel Islands in the seventeenth century and floated ashore to Guernsey where they stayed. There are some fetching pictures on the internet of the pink flower-heads waving above a rocky coastline against a brilliant blue sea and sky. Nerine is the Greek word for a sea nymph...hence their ability to swim to shore (!) but it better describes the white ones rather than the pink, I think.

When checking out the name of the bulbs I was taken to a website for girls' names. I read with wide-eyed surprise that names shape personality. So anyone called Nerine can be expected to be very emotional but blessed with common sense and insight!

#### Amaryllis

These bulbs are part of the same family as Nerines and will soon appear in supermarkets and garden centres packaged with compost, container, and bulb in a range of colours. They are one of the most satisfying bulbs to grow: the Lewis Hamiltons of the bulb world, growth is so fast it can be measured every day by willing children. The only snag is that the flower-heads can be very large and sometimes need help keeping their heads up. Small boys will not do for this job...far too fidgety...you might need some support canes.

#### **Produce Show**

The vegetable plot looks like bare earth, but below the surface there are broad beans, winter onions and garlic to be ready, I hope, for 25<sup>th</sup> July 2021, the proposed date for the next **PRODUCE SHOW**
