# FENSTANTON PARISH COUNCIL - 12th SEPTEMBER

**<u>Police report</u>:** .During the months of June and July, the latest months for which official information is available, the following crimes and incidents were reported:

8 incidents of anti-social behaviour; 5 incidents burglary; 4 incidents of criminal damage; 1 incident of other theft; 2 incidents of vehicle crime; 1 incident of violence;

The Parish Council urges Parishioners to be vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour to the Police. Telephone 101, Crimestoppers can be contacted on 0800 55 51 11 or in an emergency 999.

**HACT**: A representative from HACT (Huntingdonshire Association for Community Transport) attended the meeting and gave a comprehensive explanation of the organisation's activities. HACT is a registered charity in the Huntingdonshire area which offers a door-to-door service for people who cannot access local bus routes due to age and/ or disability, people living in rural locations with limited or no access to local bus routes or those without access to a car.

This is a pre-bookable service operating throughout Huntingdonshire five days a week. The service is based on a timetable/route and users holding a Cambridgeshire County Council bus pass can use the service free of charge after registering. To become a Ring & Ride member there is a annual membership fee of £15 which is payable on registration. For further details contact HACT on 01480 411114 or www.hact-cambs.co.uk

**<u>Speedwatch</u>**: The Parish Council resolved to allow Speedwatch to operate within the Parish following a request from the local Speedwatch Co-ordinator.

<u>A14 upgrade</u>: The Highways Agency are holding a 5 week period of informal public consultation on the A14 upgrade commencing on 9<sup>th</sup> September until 13<sup>th</sup> October. Exhibitions will be held in Hilton Village hall on **27th September** 11:00 until 20:00 and **28th September** 09:00 until 1300 and at A14 Cambridge Services from **1<sup>st</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup>** October 11:00 until 20:00.

**Annual pond clean:** The pond has been inspected and whilst it is in a generally good condition it is necessary to remove some weed. The annual pond clean has, therefore, been arranged for **5<sup>th</sup> October**. Volunteers are welcome to assist in this important undertaking although we must insist that no unaccompanied children under the age of 12 are permitted to take part. If you wish to assist please come to the pond from 10:00 and we are usually finished by 12:00.

**<u>Parking:</u>** Parishioners are reminded that it is an offence to park within 10m of/ or opposite a junction or to obstruct a footpath. This continues to be problem within the Village and the matter will be raised with the Police to take action at the next Parish Council meeting when a Police representative is expected to attend.

**Overgrowing bushes and trees etc:** Members of the Parish Council have noticed that hedges, trees and shrubs are encroaching onto footpaths. A request is, therefore, made to residents to ensure any bushes etc. that are overgrowing the footpaths are cut back to the boundary of the property. A request is also made for residents to ensure that dividing hedges between properties do not exceed the permitted height of 1m. Residents with gravel driveways are requested to sweep any spillage back onto the driveway.

## **ROMAN FENSTANTON**

In AD 43 the Romans arrived on the South Coast of England. It was some years later in AD 47 that the Romans discovered Fenstanton having first subdued the dominant local tribe, the Catuvellauni, by a combination of terror and negotiation.

We can only imagine what the population of Fenstanton thought as those iron clad soldiers marched past; they would have never seen anything like it before. Initially there would not have been any changes to the village or the way of life, although the Imperial tax collector would have made himself known to the villagers. The Romans were great road builders and three military roads were built that converged on what is today the village of Alconbury near to Huntingdon. Again, we can only imagine our Celtic forefathers standing there watching these strange men build the road that ran straight through their village joining Colchester, Cambridge and Godmanchester. It is more than probable that this new military road followed the line of an ancient track that had been used by generations of villagers but the road that the Romans built would have been straight. After all, footpaths and tracks always followed a line of high land so that flooding is minimised. Fenstanton is the only Pre-Roman village that was and is actually on that Roman Road. The continued use of the Roman Road after the



This map shows what the Romans would have found as they pushed their way north from Colchester. Fenstanton was on the edge of a great inland sea or, more accurately, a Great Fen with a few areas that were dry for only a few months of the year. Fenstanton would have still been a small Celtic settlement as I described in my earlier work 'Fenstanton before the Romans'.

Romans left was largely responsible for the uninterrupted habitation of Fenstanton through the following centuries. Looking at present day Fenstanton you will see we have a hill rising up from outside the King William IV and continuing to the higher ground by Oaklands and Headlands. Today it is difficult to imagine the rough, gravel surfaced road with grassed areas to each side, which served as a Roman road, grooved by iron wheeled vehicles and the feet of Roman legions. But this was infinitely better than anything that had gone before and was to follow for the next fifteen hundred years. The distance between Huntingdon and Cambridge in a straight line is 21mls or 33.79kms, so Jack Dady, in his book 'Beyond Yesterday', was undoubtedly correct to say that Fenstanton would have been a staging post between the two towns. It is more than probable that there were buildings along what is now the High Street and possibly a 'Mansio' (or inn) to accommodate imperial couriers and other weary travellers. Most probably any evidence of this would have been lost when the foundations of the present buildings were laid down many years later.

But then in AD61 came the Boudicca revolt which culminated in the Romans redeveloping the forts at Cambridge and Godmanchester and another to the north of the river Nene, west of the present day Peterborough. The Romans inflicted terrible vengeance on the Celts and their supporting tribes after the revolt. They put an end to the Celtic way of life forever, killing people, religion and culture. The Romans established a new capital in the Iceni lands at Caistor-by-Norwich. No record of the Iceni people exists after this point, though legends suggest that large numbers fled west into Wales and eventually settled in Ireland. There can be no doubt that young men from the village would have taken part in this revolt and we can only wonder at the level of reprisal visited on the village of Fenstanton and its people.

The hardest thing for us to imagine is the length of time that the Romans were in Britain. It was not for fifty or so years but almost four hundred years, long enough for old memories and customs to be lost and Roman practices to be considered normal. Roman coins found in the village suggest the site was in continuous use throughout the Roman occupation. Some of these coins can be seen in the Norris Museum in St lves, along with fragments of pottery also found here. The remains of a building, possibly a Romano-Britain villa, complete with hypocaust heating, limestone masonry and tiled roof were found just north of the parish boundary. It is believed that another villa stood somewhere around the Oaklands and Headlands area.

I have heard it said by older villagers that when the Oaklands houses were being built in the 1970s, Roman remains were found towards the bottom of the close. The story goes that if they had been reported it would have resulted in completion being delayed, so the remains were covered over. If true, then it is just possible that these remains are still there! These Romano-British villas were in fact self-contained agricultural estates with their own workshops, fields, workers and slave housing and accommodation for livestock. Although much of the produce would have been for home consumption a good portion would have supplied the Roman army both in Britain and mainland Europe. The river Ouse was used for most heavy transport; goods would have been taken downstream to Earith and from there go to the north via the Car Dyke, a canal for transportation that the Romans had built across the Fens.

If there were two of these villa estates in Fenstanton, one to the north the other to the south, then land must have been taken or purchased from the local Celtic people. Without a doubt the local Celtic people would have initially continued to live in their traditional round houses and farmed in the old ways. There is some evidence to suggest that these round houses were soon replaced by two-bay rectangular buildings. Very little has survived from these peasant people, just a few rubbish pits and house post holes. The village as it was would have continued to occupy its old site at Honey Hill and if you look closely at the map you will see that the Great Fen started at the bottom of Honey Hill. This would have been perfect for the people to get to and from their fishing and eel traps, wild fouling, reeds and grasses etc. Analysis of the late loom Age to the early Roman period domestic food debris has revealed a diet dominated by meat from cattle, which was supplemented by mutton, pork, and the occasional freshwater fish. There is no evidence of the consumption of domestic fowl. Being so close to the fen, mosquitoes and Malaria (Ague) would have been rampant.

It is possible that for some considerable time the villagers would have lived in splendid isolation from the Roman and Romanised British people further south west on the higher, well drained land. But ultimately they would have succumbed to Roman ways and become Romano-British, which was a fusion of the imported Roman culture and that of the indigenous Britons. One aspect of Roman influence seen in British life was the grant of Roman citizenship. At first this was granted very selectively, the number of citizens steadily increasing as people inherited citizenship and more grants were made. Eventually in AD 212, everybody except slaves and freed slaves were granted

citizenship. But for the majority of British inhabitants including our forefathers in Fenstanton, who were peasants tied to the soil, citizenship would not have dramatically altered their daily lives.

In 2002 during underpinning of the retaining wall of St Peter and St Paul's church and the demolition of adjacent farm buildings, remains of Roman occupation were revealed. In land adjacent to the Old Chapel in Chequer Street a 2004 excavation revealed two phases of Romano British activity. The earlier Romano-British phases comprised a set of four evenly spaced, perpendicular field ditches as well as several small and one larger pit. In the later Romano-British phase's two linear slots and six postholes suggest a rectangular timber building.

The Romano-British farmers carried out improvements to their crops including the introduction of Spelt, an early form of wheat that grows well in damp climates. Native livestock was improved by selective breading. Deer and pheasants were introduced from Europe. This is described in more detail in Jack Dady's book. After the Boudicca revolt had been crushed and peace returned, Fenstanton began a four hundred year period of peace known as 'Pax Romana' although the Roman authorities would have extracted a high price from the people in the form of Imperial taxation.

Although the Romans drained large areas of the Great Fen, it appears that this was mostly nearer to the coastline of the Wash. Here in Fenstanton there is no evidence yet of any form of drainage but future archaeological digs may prove otherwise. Again, if we look at the map, you will see that the river between Fenstanton and St lves appears to be much wider than today and it is in fact part of the Great Fen. The cross-river access from the south into the village of St lves would have necessitated crossing the fen, so there must have been a causeway to take people and goods over the Fen (what is now the Hemingford meadow), to the very edge of the river and the ford crossing. Mind you, at that time St lves, or Slepe as it was then, would not have been any bigger than Fenstanton and most probably the transportation of the majority of light goods and people would have used the military road to the fort and Vicus (town) at Godmanchester and to Cambridge.

What about religion? From finds made locally it can be deduced that this area would have had a multi-religious society. There is an indication from these finds that there may have been a local deity specific to the Ouse Valley. From other finds it is clear that other religions were also practiced in the Ouse Valley, but it is highly unlikely that the Christian religion came to Fenstanton at this time, although later in the Roman period Christianity became the state religion. In general Christianity was seen as a club for ambitious people, something like the communist party in the old USSR. Although 3<sup>rd</sup> century Christian silver has been found in the Nene valley, as yet nothing Christian from this period has been found in the Ouse valley.

So, what next? Well later in the year I will be writing about our village after the Romans left but, next time you are working in your garden look out for anything that looks old; flints, pottery shards, bones etc. If you watch Time Team on TV you will have a good idea what to look for. The Norris Museum is always interested in looking at finds.

# **ELSWORTH PRE-SCHOOL**

The new term has begun and the children have started to return. The new children are getting used to what is often their first

experiences away from their immediate family. They will soon get into the swing of pre-school life: showing their favourite toys and photos and taking home our resident teddies, Honey Bear and Rusty Bear. The premature end of Summer has meant that we have been inside earlier than we hoped. Thus the children have been enjoying indoor play and craft and have been baking, painting and sticking rather than spending as much time as we like on our outdoor equipment and exploring our garden. For the parents there has been a Boden Party jointly with the school.



#### Autumn apples

Autumn, Keats's season of 'mellow fruitfulness' when the hedgerows and orchards are full of ripening pomes, drupes, berries and hips – all botanical terms for different sorts of fruits in rich, inviting colours and often aromatic and juicy - the characteristics required to attract an animal to eat them up and effect seed dispersal.

Ripening is a complex process controlled by plant hormones, the chemicals by which different parts of a plant communicate with each other and trigger change. Most plant hormones are transported via the plant's vascular system, but some, like ethylene are released as gas into the air. One of the effects of ethylene release is ripening, prompting the plant to convert the starchy reserves in fruits like apples into sugars, and in many varieties causing the exposure of 'ripe' colours such as red and yellow as the green chlorophyll breaks down. This chemical process lies behind the old adage 'one bad apple spoils the cart', since one apple releasing ethylene will promote ripening and ultimately rotting in the rest. It also explains why placing a ripe banana, a prolific producer of ethylene, in a paper bag together with unripe fruit will encourage them to sweeten and soften.

Apples have inspired not only scientists – think of Sir Isaac Newton and the falling apple said to have inspired his theory of gravity - but also storytellers, and feature particularly richly in classical mythology. The judgment of Paris resulted in him awarding the golden apple to Aphrodite, who granted him Helen of Troy in return, the most beautiful woman in the world, thereby sparking the Trojan Wars, while the swiftfooted huntress Atalanta, determined never to marry, challenged all potential suitors to a running race. She won them all until Hippomenes laid down golden apples to distract her, allowing him to win the race and her hand. And Hercules had to use trickery and skulduggery to extract the golden apples from the Garden of Hesperides. But perhaps the most remarkable story still is the slow journey of the orchard apple from its wild home in the Tien Shan mountains of Central Asia eastwards to China and westwards through Turkey to Europe, diversifying over the centuries into the 7,500 cultivars grown today.

At the Botanic Garden, we will be presenting just a fraction of this rich diversity at Apple Day, which returns after a five year absence on Sunday 27 October. There'll be a try before you buy apple tasting tent, an apple edibles tent full of locally-produced goodies and lots of apple craft, trails, tours and storytelling. Tuck into the tastiest sort of heritage this autumn!

Entry to the Botanic Garden on Apple Day on Sunday 27 October, 10am-4pm, requires the purchase of an Apple Day ticket, priced £3 for everyone aged 17 and over, plus normal Garden Admission, children aged 16 and under are free. Tickets are available in advance from the Garden ticket offices from 21 September and will allow fast-track entry on Apple Day.

#### OCTOBER BULLETIN FROM CAMBRIDGESHIRE FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICE

WINTER is coming, and Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service is encouraging all residents to sweep their chimneys before the cold sets in.

Our top tips to enjoy an open fire safely:

- Have the chimney swept at least once a year, more frequently if you burn wood.
- Do not bank fires too high and remember to let them burn down well before you retire to bed.
- Check the hearth, floor and furnishings near the fire for hot sparks or embers before you go to bed.
- Use a fire or spark guard to prevent accidental fires and make sure that it has the kite mark or conforms to a relevant British/European safety standard.
- Do not place objects on or over the mantle-piece which may cause you to stand too close to the fire to reach or use them.
- Inspect your chimney breast regularly particularly in the roof space to ensure that it is sound and that sparks or fumes cannot escape through cracks or broken bricks
- Avoid burning resinous woods as soot builds up quickly
- Buy only suitable fuels.
- Do not overload the grate or appliance.

Above all, ensure you have a working smoke alarm fitted on each floor or your home. This will give you give you an early warning to a fire, allowing extra time for occupants in the home to escape.
