#### THE BUS STOP IN SCOTTS CRESCENT, HILTON

Another School Year and notices on a fence cause me to wonder how many in Hilton know why there is a school bus stop in Scotts Crescent. A wonderful eleven-year old girl, crossing the road, on the morning of 5 December 1985, to catch the school bus at the bus shelter on the main road (the only school bus pick-up point then in Hilton) was knocked down and killed in front of the other students at the shelter. A remarkable family, living in Scotts Crescent, was devastated. None of us will ever forget the sense of loss felt at the funeral service in the Church, attended by most of the students.

A day or so later, Maurice Furniss (then the Clerk to the Parish Council), the Head of St Peters School (then the catchment Secondary School for Hilton) and I met at the bus shelter. I had just been appointed the Parish Council's Governor on the St Peters School Governing Body. Mr Arthur Lee of Whippet Coaches immediately agreed to create a second school bus stop, and the spot in Scotts Crescent was identified. By doing this, the need for any child living in Hilton to cross the main road in the morning and afternoon was completely removed.

There is now a zebra-crossing, but I suspect the bus stop in Scotts Crescent remains the most effective road-safety measure ever taken in Hilton – but tragically too late for Caroline.

## Farewell and best wishes, from the Vicar of Fenstanton...

By the time you are reading this I will have taken my last services as Vicar of Fenstanton on 17<sup>th</sup> September, and will have moved out of the vicarage (as at the time of writing of this note).

It has been an excellent 10 years of ministry here with you. Much of this has involved building up church life and the faith of the congregation. I leave a vibrant church with people of all ages, particularly many families, together with a well-ordered church building, and a finely renovated church centre. These buildings provide a wonderful set of spaces for community based activities. We have seen such activities grow over my time here through, for example, the Fringe in the Fen music festivals, together with the celebrations last year in 2016 for the 300<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the birth of Lancelot 'Capability' Brown, the famous landscape architect. The church is now open every day during the day for you to look around, for reflection, and for prayer.

Some of my ministry has had a public face. Clearly this is at its most obvious in the services I have led week by week on a Sunday, and in the after-service chit-chat. During my time here we have started serving filter coffee, and this has been welcome attraction for people to stay. Some of these services are aimed more broadly, such as our Back-to-Church Sundays, Mothering Sunday, Harvest, Remembrance, and the services leading up to Christmas.

It has been lovely to have a steady stream of babies and toddlers coming for baptism, as well as the weddings here from time to time. It is worth reminding ourselves that anyone who lives in the parish has a legal right to be married in the Parish Church, and, in recent years, it is now possible for someone with a reasonable association with the village to be married in church. I pay tribute to my licenced colleague, Harvey Marshall who is well known in the village, who continues to take many funerals.

By contrast, some parts of my ministry have been much more private; conversations where people are looking for answers to deep questions, or who may be in a state of distress, whether they be regular church goers or not. I will miss the ongoing everyday conversations that, being vicar, people have trusted me with.

I leave a church in good health, spiritually, financially, and in its engagement with its community, seen particularly with the setting up of our Community Fund. I leave a church with many able leaders, giving thanks for their ministries, and with two people here training for ministries in our church.

Now for the future. There are ongoing discussions about how Fenstanton may be linked with other local parishes. Almost certainly, the smaller parish of Fen Drayton will be linked with Fenstanton; informal links have been established for some time. There is less certainty about what happens thereafter. However the Parish Church is minded, together with the Diocese, that there will be a priest resident in the Vicarage here in Fenstanton, even if his or her duties are not yet firmed up. It seems likely that there may be a gap in the appointment of a vicar whilst any future arrangement is being worked through.

Let me say again that this has been a most rewarding ministry here in Fenstanton. The vicarage has been a wonderful home for our family; we have been fortunate in being able to bring up our girls here.

Let me thank you for your support in my time here, and wish you every blessing for the future. This is a lovely village, and we shall miss its security and easy manner. I wish you all well,

#### Whippet Buses Withdrawal 1A

For residents of Fenstanton there is a temporary solution with a service by Dews Coaches. Please note:

- There will be changes to the timetable.
- The service will operate broadly hourly between St Ives, Fenstanton and Bar Hill only.
- Passengers will need to change buses at St Ives or Bar Hill for journeys to Cambridge.

- Some journeys now start or end at Fenstanton on Whippet Coaches service C This is only temporary lasting for a year. This will give communities and Parish Councils nine months to consider a longer-term, sustainable solution.

## Fenstanton and the Gregory Brothers:

Recently I found on Facebook a daily newspaper web link that allowed people to enter their home town and see the names of the men from that town who fell in the battles of WW1.

I had a look at the link for Fenstanton and found the names of the soldiers that I had previously written about but to my surprise I found two men that I did not know of. These two names are not on the village war memorial or the roll of honour in the parish church. So I decided to research the two unknown soldiers to see if they did have a connection to our village. The soldiers were named as William Charles Gregory and Albert Edward Gregory and they were both killed in 1915.

The brothers' father, also William Charles, was a coastguard and had served in a number of coastal stations but especially in Northern Ireland. Both William and Albert were born in Ballyhaskin, Carrowdore NI and were baptised there together with their sister Ann Elizabeth.

Then the family moved to England. The father served with the coast guards in Whitstable, Kent where another son George was born in 1898. Then William Senior moved stations this time to Broadstairs in Kent. Here two more children were born, Henry Ernest and Esther. These children were baptised in St Peter's, Broadstairs. The last child was born in 1904.

At the time of the 1911 census William Charles Gregory Senior was registered as living with his family in Wandsworth London and was a retired Coastguard. Another son had been born in Wandsworth named Arthur. So far so good, but what does all this have to do with Fenstanton? On the face of it nothing, but let us progress.

Both William Charles and Albert Edward Gregory were killed in action 9<sup>th</sup> May 1915 on the opening day of the battle of Aubers Ridge in Belgium. They have no known graves and are commemorated on the Ploegsteert Memorial in Belgium. In the Commonwealth War Graves Commission records both these lads had a home address of Bell Lane, Fenstanton. Unfortunately houses were not numbered in 1915 so we do not know which house the family lived in.

Quite why the Gregory family should move to Fenstanton I do not know, I can only guess that there may have been a family connection with the village. I do not think that they would have chosen Fenstanton out of thin air. After all we are too far away from Wandsworth in south London for them to have even known about us and we most certainly did not need a coast guard!

On the 30<sup>th</sup> April 1921 the Fenstanton war memorial was unveiled and the following is part of the report in the Hunts Post. "In the presence of a large and reverent assembly, the obelisk to the memory of the men of Fenstanton who fell in the war was unveiled on Sunday afternoon by the Lord Lieutenant of the County. The obelisk stands in a commanding position in the churchyard. It is 17ft, 6in in height and is together with its base and subbase constructed of Portland stone.

We can only guess the feelings of the Gregory family as they watched the unveiling knowing that their two son's names were not on the memorial, even more so as their other son Henry Ernest had serving in the Royal Fusiliers throughout WW1. The two brother's names do not appear on a WW1 memorial anywhere in this country.

Further research shows that the family lived in Fenstanton until at least 1926 as Esther Gregory married Harold Allgood in the parish church in 1924 and Henry Ernest Gregory married Pricilla Hammond in 1926, also in the parish church. The 1939 register shows that Esther and Harold Allgood were living in Chesterton, Cambridge with Esther's widowed mother Esther. Henry Ernest and Pricilla Gregory were living in Bedford. William the father does not appear in the parish record of burials so we can assume that he died away from the village.

## HILTON WI

Our September meeting was really interesting, as Sandra King told us about her passion for a little known Paralympic sport called Boccia. It has been developed from bowls and boules and pétanque to enable people with limited abilities in their upper bodies to play the game and to compete in the Paralympics and in so doing win a considerable amount of bronze, silver and gold medals for England.

Sandra started off by being sport minded at school and has inspired many disabled children to find that is not what you can't do but what you discover through sport what you can do. Not all but many of the competitors are restricted to wheelchairs but they are all able to play. Those with the most restricted movements of their upper body can use a slide to roll the ball down or a helper can ensure that they are stable by holding the wheelchair.

Starting off as a PE teacher Sandra progressed through various courses to teach disabled children that her motto of 'Find what you are good at and don't let an opportunity pass' could work for them and take every chance they could to become competitive in their sport.

The rules differ slightly from bowls but the aim is the same, to get nearest to the jack and score points for the team. After going to Greece in 2004 and then Portugal in 2005 Sandra has worked her way forward to be an inspiration to her team and has taken them to Beijing where they won Gold medals and then to London in the ExCel Arena which was adapted specially for them. She is now a Technical Delegate for Boccia and ensures everything is in place for the teams and spectators at Olympic and Paralympic level. Both her mother and daughter were Games-makers at the 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games and it was surprising how much work went on behind the scenes to ensure the athletes are well looked after and have their physios, carers, helpers and even timetables available at all times.

Sandra was in Russia the day before she came to talk to us helping a boy from Hinchingbrooke, who is only seventeen but has great potential to compete in his class, to do his best and we are sure she will continue to encourage all her athletes to do their best in sport and in the rest of their lives.

## HILTON BRITISH LEGION

The annual Poppy Appeal begins on Saturday October 28 th , ending two weeks later on Remembrance Sunday, November 12 th. As always anyone from 17 to 100 who would like to be a collector is very , very welcome so do get in touch . In1917 the Great War continued and on the Western Front the grim battle for both armies raged at enormous cost in casualties at Passchendaele.

On the home front life was hard too. By Christmas meat had virtually disappeared in some places so that 67 million tons each month could be sent to the Front . In 1917 Lord Davenport , the Minister of Food Control issued a statement saying : - " Heads of families should endeavour to limit themselves to the weekly purchase for each person in the household to the following per head :- 4 1/2 pounds (2.1 kg) of bread , 2 1/2 pounds (1.3 kg) of meat and 3/4 of a pound ( 340 kg ) of sugar . Note : some housewives may not afford the full allowance of meat so they may have to exceed the bread allowance. This is deemed a patriotic duty and a

necessity. " Flour was often made from ground turnips and the cost of bread had risen from

one penny (less than 0.5p) in 1900 to six pennies (2.5 p) by 1918.

In August 1917 the President of the Board of Education estimated that for the first year of the war 600.000 children had been put to work prematurely.

Finally, in October the local Everyman Remembered tributes by members of the Royal British Legion will take place in Broughton, St Ives, Woodhurst and Abbots Ripon for a total of 11 men with more to follow in November and December, not to mention a relentless 16 ceremonies next year for 55 more. These are indeed sombre numbers.
