flitting along the path in front of your feet.


In the distance the familiar sound of the resident

FENSTANTON PARISH COUNCIL meeting - July 9th

Police report: During the months of May, the latest information available, the following crimes and incidents were reported: 2 incidents of anti-social behaviour; 2 incidents of violence; 1 incident of criminal damage; 1 incident of shoplifting. Parishioners are reminded to be vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour to the Police telephone 101, Crimestoppers can be contacted on 0800 55 51 11 or in an emergency 999.

Whippet Coaches timetable: Changes to the Whippet Coaches timetable became effective from 26th July. Details are available on the Whippet Coaches website.

Wiser Recycling unwanted electrical items collection: The collection held on 1st June resulted in 5.653 tonnes of unwanted electrical appliances being collected which has raised £210.44 towards Parish funds. It was noted that the last collection failed to collect from some roads in the Village and this situation will be addressed before the next collection. It is also hoped to include Greenfields, Maytrees and Elizabeth Court in the next collection. The next collection is proposed for the 1st December although it was felt by the meeting that it may be advantageous to postpone the collection until the beginning of January. The request will be made to Wiser Recycling and once a confirmed date is known it will be publicized through Spectrum.

Wyton on the Hill development and the implications to the Parish.; Mr Curtis of Costin and Co, the agent for the developer, addressed the meeting concerning the effects the Wyton on the Hill development will have on the Parish and Village. The meeting was advised that the Wyton on the Hill development will comprise of the construction of 4,500 dwellings over a 20 year period and will include a comprehensive social infrastructure including schools, doctors' surgery and a care home. Members of the Parish Council expressed concern at the effect a development of the size proposed, combined with expected development at Alconbury and further growth in St Ives, will have on the existing road infrastructure and the impact of further rat running through the Village.

Concern was also raised over the effect these developments will have on Hinchingsbrooke Hospital. The Parish Council has requested that it is kept fully advised of the situation and is involved in future meetings.

Proposed move to a new premises and branch modernization for Fenstanton Post Office: The meeting considered the implications of the proposed move for the Post Office from its existing location to Ash's Shop. It was agreed to respond to the current consultation, which concludes on 6th August. It was felt that it is imperative the Village retains the services of a Post Office, however a number of concerns were raised over the proposals. Details of the proposal are obtainable from the Post Office. Members of the public are urged to comment on the proposal through the consultation.

The next meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on **Thursday 10th September 2015** at 7:30 at Fenstanton & Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton. Members of the public and press are welcome.

A14: The Parish Council would like to thank everyone who attended the open meeting arranged by the Planning Inspectorate in the Village Hall on Monday 13th July. Over 175 people attended with many having to stand outside by the open windows to hear what was being said.

We hope that the Planning Inspectorate were able to gain a sense of the general concerns villagers are feeling about this proposed new road scheme and the effect it will have on the village.

The Parish Council continues to follow the timetable set out by the Planning Inspectorate and will make further comment on progress at the next Parish Council meeting.

Casual Vacancy: The Parish Council would like to congratulate Sara Partridge on her success in joining the Parish Council. We would like to thank the other candidates for their putting their names forward and hope that they continue to be interested in Parish Council matters.

Rural Housing Exception Scheme: Due to other commitments representatives from Huntingdon District Council were unable to attend the July meeting to explain further how the scheme works and what the process would be, if they are able to attend the next meeting this will be included on the agenda.

Volunteering Group: Councillors Justo Perez and Anne Goodridge held a successful first meeting, with good attendance, looking to pull together a talent pool within the village to perhaps be able to undertake small tasks/projects approved by the Parish Council.

Domestic Grass Mowing on the Green; A letter will be drafted to send to those houses mowing grass in front of their properties reminding the owners that the land in question remains part of the green.

The Beacon: In light of requests to put the Beacon up on a temporary basis a working group has been set up to see if and how the Beacon could be made fit for that purpose.



Fenstanton Village punishments through the Ages



The whipping-post, stocks, pillory and ducking stool all formerly stood in the market place (now the area around the clock tower), before being moved to a corner of the (old) school grounds in 1882. Jack Dady in his book 'Beyond Yesterday' stated that Charles Jacobs (1882-1922) remembered playing with them long after they had been removed. Also Miss Gertrude Peet (1872-1941) remembers seeing a man held in the stock.

Dairymen selling contaminated butter and milk, fraudulent corn, coal and cattle dealers, thieves and keepers of infamous houses, could be harshly punished by the stocks and pillory. The medieval punishment of standing in the pillory saw the culprit strapped into a wooden contraption that held both the hands and head. The head was exposed to the good people of the village who hurled abuse, turds, rotten fruit and often much worse at the offender. Some of the more 'unpopular' people sent to the pillory lost their lives, the reaction of the public being so forceful that hard objects were thrown. The stocks held the offender by the feet only but the occupant was still open to the same abuses.

The ducking stool was a punishment that was inflicted on scolds, suspected witches and also on butchers, bakers and brewers who gave short measure or sold adulterated foods. The village pond was much bigger and deeper in those days. 'Swimming a witch' was a method of trial for suspected witches and next year I will be writing about one particular Fenstanton witch who suffered this method of trial.

Fenstanton had a post set up in the market place for the sole objective of displaying public whippings. Some authors call whipping "a half death" because of the amount of people who died from it; caused by an infection, loss of blood or damage to an organ. There were many reasons for a person to be whipped but the most common was for being a 'Foreigner', a person unknown to the village such as a vagrant or an unemployed traveller begging for money. Such people would be whipped and passed on to the next village probably to be whipped yet again.

In medieval times vagrancy was a grim predicament, and laws and statutes were passed to curtail vagrancy and begging. Vagrancy became an ever-increasing problem after Henry VIII ordered the dissolution of the monasteries and religious houses as often before the dissolution they gave sustenance and shelter to vagrants. The Fenstanton parish church register shows a number of incidences of an unknown person being found dead in or around the village.

Women who 'gossiped' had a steel device placed over their heads with a piece that secured their tongue. This is the origin of the saying "*Tell-tale tit-your tongue shall split – every little puppy shall have a little bit*", used by the children of the village to torment the woman wearing the device.





FENSTANTON FOOTPATHS



The footpath maintenance contractor completed the second cut of our parish footpaths in mid-August and with the preceding dry conditions, the paths are now in very good condition. The contractor has also replaced an old and rickety wooden stile on the riverside path (FP No 13*), with a new metal kissing gate which should make things easier for the less agile walker! There is also a fine new wooden bridge over West Brook opposite to the entrance to West End Farm at the end of FP No 10*, on the south side of the A14. So improvements do happen gradually, even in these times of budget cuts!

Talking of the south side paths, I walked these in mid-August just after the wheat harvest. FP No 7, to Conington, looked strange as it appears now as a narrow strip running through the stubble of the harvested crop (see photo). Straw from the harvester had carpeted the footpath to provide a slightly softer footfall on the rock-hard earth. FootPaths 10 and 7 which run from the Hilton Road to the Potton Road are a rewarding walk for their views of the West End Farm gravel pits and the tunnel effect of the blackthorn trees beside the water. During my walk, I stumbled on a “geocache” box. I’m not a “geocacher” but it was interesting to get an idea of what it was all about. 

Stack fires can quickly spread and not only endanger people and livestock, but also life-long work on farms. Stacks burn very slowly meaning crews are committed for long periods of time, making them unavailable for other emergencies. Don't forget, many firefighters attending incidents like these in rural parts of our county are on-call personnel and their retention at a stack fire impacts directly upon business and services in their community.

What can you do? We're urging residents and those passing through rural areas to keep a careful watch. Do you see someone acting suspiciously around stores of hay or straw? Is there an unusual vehicle near farm buildings? Become a community member of Arson Watch and keep an eye on stacks in your area.

Report suspicious activity to police on 101 and dial 999 if you see a stack fire.

FLU Vaccination

The influenza vaccination is offered to all those aged 65 and over and those considered in an 'at risk' group, including carers. If you are unsure whether you are eligible please ask at reception.

Childhood Flu

The flu nasal vaccine is going to be available for 2, 3 and 4 year olds from the end of October. A letter will be sent to the parents/guardians of all eligible children inviting them to make an appointment.

Meningococcal ACWY Vaccination

Public Health England have identified a continuing increase in the MenW disease in England and Wales since 2009. To reduce the rapid increase in this disease a vaccination programme has been implemented. This vaccine will also provide protection against meningococcal types A, C and Y.

Those in the 2014/15 school year 13 have been assessed as the priority cohort for vaccination, therefore this is actively being offered to those who are aged 18 years on 31st August 2015.

Letters will be sent to all those eligible inviting them to make an appointment.

Those aged between 19-25 are also eligible to receive this vaccine and it is recommended for those attending university/further education for the first time. Please book an appointment with the practice nurse.

Meningococcal B Infant vaccination

The MenB vaccination is a new three dose programme for babies aged two, four and 12-13 months of age and will be offered routinely at your child's immunisation appointments.

The meningococcal disease is more common in children under five years, with a higher number of cases in babies under 12 months of age and peak incidence at five months, therefore the two doses at two and four months constitute the 'primary course' required to ensure optimum protection for babies ahead of peak incidence at five months. The third dose at 12-13 months provides longer term protection.

Arriving late for appointments


