



## Riverport Medical Practice August 2108 Update

#### Latest News

We have recently employed an Advanced Nurse Practitioner and a Senior Practice Nurse to our team and believe that they will be instrumental in helping us to offer a wider range of clinicians with whom our patients can consult. Within our group we will have a mix of male and female GPs all of whom have individual specialities, 2 Nurse Practitioners, 4 Practice Nurses, 3 Healthcare Assistants, 4 Dispensers and a team of managers, administrators and receptionists. We are all really excited about the merger of our practices and the improvements we will be making to our systems and services.

#### Staff training

At the end of August and through the first half of September all staff at both Parkhall and Orchard Surgeries will be undergoing training on their new clinical system. ## Fenstanton History By John Deeks

## Fenstanton and Mr Henry Cornwell's Well:

In February 2017 I wrote an essay outlining some of the more interesting and unusual entries in the parish register.

One of these is as follows; 1740 Aug 31 KILBOURN, John &

KING, Richard both drowned in a well

At the time I thought that this sounded a little odd, so I undertook further research and found a report that gave me a good account of the accident.

#### Firstly the characters:

Mr Henry Cornwell lived in the village but he was not born here; he was an attorney at law. He was wealthy and would have owned a large house somewhere in the village. He was an attorney to some of the more prosperous men in the village including the very wealthy Joseph Elles whose will he prepared in 1728. He was a church warden of the parish church from 1717 to 1726.

James Warren does not appear to be a local man and we know nothing about him except that he was an engineer of some sort.

Richard King was born in Fenstanton and was christened in the parish church on the 18<sup>th</sup> February 1724. His father was Richard King and his mother was Anne Munns, they married in 1724.

John Kilbourne a carpenter by trade was a local man whose family have been recorded in the village since 1621. In 1681 he married Anne Colton. Together they appear to have had at least four children. For some time he was a church warden at the parish church. Fenstanton being such a small village all of these characters would have known each other very well.

#### Now for the story:

In his garden Mr Cornwall discovered an ancient, deep and very narrow well, previously unknown to the locals. Wishing to make use of the new water supply he employed a James Warren who was known as an expert on such matters and was quite famous for projects of that nature. On Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> September James Warren attended the well site and was very much aware of the effect of damp and gasses from a well that had been closed up for so long.

A year or two prior James had nearly died working on just such a well and in much the same circumstances. Having felt the damp, and with the narrowness of the well, he was reluctant to descend and inspect the wall brickwork and water.

A young servant of Mr Cornwall, a Richard King, ignorant of the dangers involved said he was ready to descend the well. By means of a ladder he readily descended but finding the effects of the cold too much, he climbed back to the top. Once more he tried and he descended using a sling and in minutes he was overcome and suffocated, fell into the water where he died before any help could be given.

John Kilbourne who was watching the procedures, moved with sympathy for the young man, got into the sling and descended as quickly as possible. Unhappily for his family before he reached the water and the lifeless body of Richard King, he underwent the same fate.

Both Richard King and John Kilbourne were buried in the parish churchyard on 31<sup>st</sup> August 1740. Mr Henry Cornwell died in 1752 and is also buried in the churchyard.

#### COMMUNITY BUS SURVEY

In March 2019, it is likely that St Ives and the surrounding area/villages will see either a reduction in or removal of the existing bus routes. Fenstanton Parish Council instigated a meeting, hosted by St Ives Town Council, for neighbouring Parish Council representatives to get together and discuss current views, plans (if any) and possible ideas. The outcome of the meeting was the preparation of a questionnaire, the aim of which is to try and establish what the future needs are of the community and bus routes.

The survey will be in on-line and hard copy formats which we would ask residents to please take the time to complete. The on-line will shortly be posted in the Parish Council section of the village website <a href="http://parishcouncil.fenstanton-village.co.uk">http://parishcouncil.fenstanton-village.co.uk</a> but those of you who have signed up for e-mails from the website will receive a link. If you are not signed up for this service please consider it. We will ask Ron's Farm Shop. Ash's and the Post Office to hold hard copies for collection

#### PITFIELD PLAY AREA

This is now open; this is the start of improvements around the village and we hope residents' children are enjoying the new playground. We will be cutting all the foliage and hedges in this area trimmed in September when the school holidays are over as it will require a chipper to be used and from a Health & Safety point of view this cannot be done when children may be present. We are also adding rubbish bins, signage, table and chairs.

#### **CEMETERY**

**Groundwork:** Work is being undertaken to remove one part of the footpath from the walnut tree and round bench in the centre to the far side hedge to free up space for more plots. **Headstones and tombs:** 

We are obtaining quotes for remedial work to these where deemed necessary. It has been brought to our attention that there is some uneven ground in the cremated remains area. Please also be careful there whilst we arrange to get this area flattened with a roller. **Trees**: We are aware some of the trees on the main pathway are in need of a trim, which we will be arranging. **Bin:** The bins in the graveyard near the school and near the Church itself are for cemetery visitors only. Please do not dump your household rubbish in these. **General Tidiness:** Surplus soil, grass trimmings and clumps of foliage are being left at the bottom of the hedge nearest the school. Please refrain from doing this and help keep the cemetery nice and tidy. There is a surplus soil pile by the shed.

#### BINS AND SIGNAGE THROUGHOUT THE PARISH

New bins and signage to cover various problems will be placed in the in the appropriate areas.

Please help to take care of the parish by using the bins and noting the reminders in the signage.

#### **GRANTS**

The Parish Council invites applications for grants yearly and these are considered at the September Finance and Constitution Committee meeting (date to be confirmed) for recommendation to the Full Council meeting on Thursday 11 October. Please contact the Clerk if you would like the paperwork. Alternatively it can be downloaded from the public documents section on the website.

#### DOG FOULING/DOGS ON LEADS

This is a problem throughout the village. Please be responsible for clearing up any mess your dog may make. This is particularly important in areas where children play as it can be a great health risk. Bags containing dog mess can be placed in any bin as long as suitably tied at the top. This applies throughout the parish. Could you please also keep your dogs on leads when and where appropriate. Some extra signage will go up in due course at various sites in the parish.

#### HEADLANDS

Speeding: Please take care not to speed throughout the village but in particular it has been noted that speeding is an issue in Headlands. Play Area (behind Dove Close): We have placed 'No Ball Games' signs on the fence at the bottom of residents' gardens. We appreciate this has caused some consternation as we were unable to explain in full until this issue of Spectrum. The Parish Council is not banning ball games in the general play area, rather it is pointing out that balls should not be kicked up against residents' fences or over fences into their gardens. All residents have a right to enjoy their gardens in relative peace and quiet and the Parish Council was approached and asked to help with this particular problem. The open area at Hampton Close is a short walk away for more vigorous ball games. Please be considerate to all residents.

#### **HIGH STREET**

Could we ask that you please keep the pavements clear along the main route through the village; bins should be moved as soon as possible and whilst we realise parking is a problem in the parish, please don't park on the pavements

#### **CLOCK TOWER PARKING**

Just a reminder that parking at the Clock Tower is for all residents and that the maximum stay here is **two hours**. We restrict this so that there is some parking available to a wide section of the community and to keep short term parking away from the High Street. There is longer term parking available in the Chequer Street car park.

## HILTON BRITISH LEGION

St Ives Women's Section Wreath at the Menin Gate on 10<sup>th</sup> August (bottom right)



In 1928 the British Legion, as it then was, organised a trip to France for First World War veterans, widows and comrades. This was the first opportunity for bereaved families to visit their loved ones' graves, in a lot of cases. A contingent of 11,000 travelled to France and Belgium and visited War Memorials and Cemeteries, this culminated on 8<sup>th</sup> August 1928, with a parade headed by British Legion Standards, through Ypres to the Menin Gate, where a service was held.

The Royal British Legion decided to commemorate The Great Pilgrimage of 1928, and to remember the start of the last 100 days of the war at the battle of Amiens, 100 years ago. I am extremely honoured and privileged to have been asked to represent St Ives RBL Women's Section by carrying a wreath to the Menin Gate and being able to take part in this ceremony and service, in honour of all those who gave their lives, over 100 years ago so we can have our freedom.

On 5<sup>th</sup> August a total of 65 coaches carrying British RBL Standard Bearers and Wreath Bearers, crossed the Channel to Calais and then we were transported to different hotels in France and Belgium. On the Monday and Tuesday we were shown battlefields, trenches, War Memorials and Cemeteries escorted by our Leger Representatives.

Then, on 8<sup>th</sup> August we travelled to Ypres for the Grand Parade, where we were joined by French and Belgium RBL members. I really cannot describe how I felt marching through Ypres, past the Cloth Hall, behind The Royal Marines' Band, about 1,200 RBL Standards and I don't know how many Wreath Bearers, in front and behind me, and the onlookers all applauding and cheering us on. The whole experience was a complete emotional roller coaster.

Unfortunately, there was no media coverage, the BBC did show the service and parade at Amiens, held on the same day.

## **Local Weather Watch**

#### **Local Weather watch**

After weeks of drought and seemingly endless days of sun and temperatures well above average so far this summer, one should perhaps remember that only 6 years ago Britain was experiencing its wettest summer for over a century.

Whether you are enjoying or enduring the summer this year, it is certainly exceptional but has yet to break many records so far as I write this article in the first week in August. Comparisons with the record breaking summer of 1976 are increasingly being made. At the time I was living in North London. In that year the hottest weather occupied a 20 day period coinciding with the Wimbledon tennis championships when for 15 of those days the shade temperature reached or exceeded 32.2C (90F) somewhere in Britain. The average daily maximum temperature in June was 24.5C (76F) and in July it was 26.8C (80F). Over the whole of that summer it rained on just 8 days, producing a total of 36mm (1.4 inches). There was no rain between 16 July and 27August, a total of 42 days.

This summer the average daily maximum temperature in June was 21.6C (71F) and in July it was 26.6C (79.6F). The difference this year is that it has been more humid with higher night time temperatures than in 1976. Also, the heat has gradually increased and could yet go higher. The total rainfall for June and July was 23.6mm (0.94 inches) from rain on 7 days. There was no rain between between 10 June and 26 July, a total of 47 days. Even the much heralded Storm Hector did not bring any rain to our region. Gardens have inevitably suffered (as have gardeners!) perhaps reflected in the reduction in produce entries for the Feast Week Show. Prior to meteorological summer's commencement on 1 June there were also three Spring heat waves, one of 5 days in April and two in May, the latter coinciding with the early and late Spring bank holidays.

We have not been the only ones experiencing exceptional heat this summer. To put our summer in perspective here are some examples:

Canada. Ottawa in Ontario recoded 47C (116.6F) on 2 July

Georgia. Tbilisi the capital recorded 40.5 (104.9F) on 4 July (a new record for the country)

Japan. Kumagaya near Tokyo recorded 41.1C (106F) on 23 July Norway. North of the Arctic Circle, 34.5 (94F) recorded in July

USA. Los Angeles recorded 47.2 (117F) followed by their hottest July night in history of 26.1C (79F)

Algeria. Ouargia recorded 51.3C (124.3F) on 5 July

Oman. In the town of Quriyat the temperature never fell below 42.6C (108.6F)

for a full 24 hours in June, thought to be a global record

Spain and Portugal. During a heatwave in August the temperature reached 46.4C (115.5F) In Cordoba, Spain and more widely 45C (113F) in other parts of Spain and Portugal.

So you might ask, are there any places where it has not been hot this summer? Apparently iceland is one such place which is having its worst summer for a century. If you like it cool, that's the place to go!
